ENGINE BREAKS DOWN. — The Souris-Georgetown train arrived in the city six hours behind schedule yesterday owing to an engine breakdown on the way. And be esse ye Hearthe and blesse ye Board,
And blesse eche Place of Rest,
And blesse ye Doore that opens wyde
To strangers as to kin;
And blesse eche cristal window-pane
That lets ye sunlichte in,
And blesse ye Rooft-tree overhead,
And everle sturdye wall;
Ye Peace of God, ye Peace of Man,
Ye Peace of Love on alle."

Latin America Takes Action

A number of Latin American countries have abandoned their defence-sitting positions to take definite action against the threat of Axis aggression. American leadership, particularly since the passing of the Lease-Lend Bill, has been important. The British was generally welcomed in Latin America except by Fifth Column elements and certain sections of Chilean opinion fearful of war in the Pacific.

First important steps were the defence agreements announced by the United States with Mexico and Panama, both of which countries have been subjected to strong Nazi influences. The Mexican agreement was accompanied by statements of most cordial sympathy with both the United States and the democratic cause. Its most important result will be to secure United States communication with the Panama Canal through the use of Mexican naval bases, particularly on the west coast, and the right to use Mexican air bases. The defence of the Canal was greatly facilitated also by the agreement of the Republic of Panama to allow the United States to erect defences outside the narrow Canal Zone. Important Uruguayan and Colombian papers called for the negotiation of similar agreements with the United States.

When the United States suddenly seized all Axis and Danish ships in her ports, her precedent was promptly followed by Cuba and Costa Rica, which are closely tied to her foreign policy, and by Venezuela, which is linked to the anti-Axis cause by her oil interests. A favourable surprise came from the action of Peru and Ecuador, who acted very forthrightly, although they were considered subject to German, Italian, and Japanese influences. Uruguay took over four ships, and Mexico demonstrated her loyalty to the new agreement by taking into custody two German and ten Italian ships. Most of the republics claimed the ships expropriated for reasons of "public necessity," but Mexico argued that the vessels would cancel Axis debts for pre-war oil shipments. This latter is notable as suggesting a means by which Latin American countries can answer the Axis one-sided barter proposals.

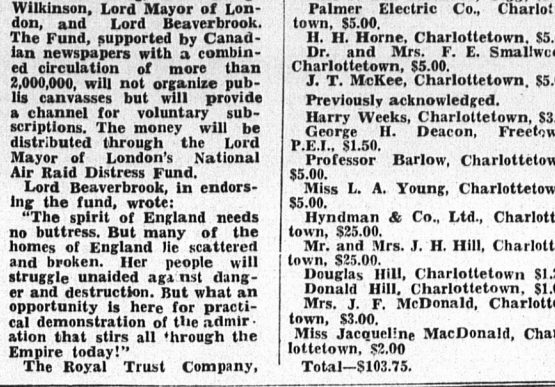
Lord Beaverbrook, in endorsing the fund, wrote:

EATING, NOT STARVING, URGES IN BLEEDING ULCERS TREATMENT

BOSTON, April 28 — Eating instead of the usual "starvation" method is recommended for bleeding ulcers of the stomach.

Dr. T. Grier Miller of the University of Pennsylvania told the American College of Physicians that in various studies a 67 per cent reduction in the mortality rate from the ailment had been effected by "prompt feeding" instead of "the better-known starvation program."

"The reduction in the death rate, on the average from one to three per cent," he said, "is comparable to that in pneumonia from the sulfanilamides, though it has not been brought about by the elaboration of a new drug, but by the discovery of the cause or by the use of any special diet."

"It has resulted simply from adequate feeding together with the administration of reasonable quantities of fluid, begun as soon as the patient comes under observation, even if still in the midst of his hemorrhage."

Other doctors at the meeting, who said they had tried the "non-starvation" technique, said soups and mashed potatoes had been given promptly to patients with good results.

It was admitted that the subject of treating bleeding ulcers is "controversial." Up to date, the treatment of choice has been an extremely restricted diet as dis-
