es against the leaders of the party who have adopted the Oxford side of the controversy.

Lord Oxford takes the line that there is no communication or ostracism and that Lloyd George has not been driven out, but that he refused to come in. In his letter to Sir Godfrey Collins, Lord Oxford recalls the whole controversy and states that messages sent by Oxford and Viscount Grey to the British Cabinet were "declarations of policy made in the government press, from which he dissented."

Shadow Cabinet

Lord Oxford proceeds: "The 'Shadow Cabinet' is a substitute, when the leaders of the party are in opposition, for the actual cabinet when they are in office, and it has always been understood that membership in this involves similar obligations. I have at in many cabinets under various Prime Ministers and I have not known one of them who would not have treated such a communication sent at such a time as equivalent to resignation. I certainly so regarded it."

"Had the Liberal leader adopted Mr. Lloyd George's view on the general strike," Lord Oxford continues, "we should have been doing our best to weaken the authority of the Government which for the moment was the embodiment and organ of national self-defense against the gravest domestic danger which has threatened the country in our time."

Denies Ostracism

"There is no question here of excommunication or ostracism; there is no such process known in the Liberal party. The leader of the party is neither pope nor autocrat, but he has always claimed and exercised full liberty of choice as to his colleagues and advisors."

"Mr. Lloyd George in the exercise of his judgment and for a reason of which I am last to question the gravity, chose to separate himself in a most formal manner from our deliberations in a moment of great emergency. He was not driven out; he refused to come in."
