AN occasional correspondent writes: From the Royal Gazette of October 5th, 1840, I find that the exhibition that year was held on September 30, (no place mentioned), the account of proceedings, together with the prize list, occupying 5 1/2 inches of single column. The most notable exhibits were a drumhead cabbage, weighing 20 pounds, squash 115 pounds, pumpkin 100 pounds. A cucumber, raised by Elisha Hooper of Bedeque, weighed nearly six pounds, length a trifle short of 24 inches. A later issue (October 20) of the same paper said that on the previous Saturday a carcass of pork weighing 689 pounds was brought into market, the animal's age being 28 months. In 1842 the fair was held on October 6th and the Royal Gazette of the 12th crowded the report of it together with the prize list into 3 1/2 inches, single column. The day was unfavorable and the affair was an evident failure, scarcely exceeding a good market day.

Bryen on the well known pork-dealer and taxidermist of that place, was united in the holy bonds of matrimony, to Miss Gertrude L. Holmes, formerly of Alberton, late of Boston, Mass. Rev. R. Opie, of York, tied the nuptials. Only the immediate friends of the contracting parties were present. The bridal party presented a charming appearance as they stood under a magnificent floral arch, and repeated the words which made the twain one flesh. The bride was attended by her cousin, Miss Helen Clements, of Charlottetown, and her pretty little niece, Hattie Clements, of B. P. road, whilst the groom was supported by his brother, Fred W. After the ceremony was performed, the guests sat down to a sumptuous wedding supper gotten up in Mr. Clements' and Miss Hattie Holmes' most pleasing manner. The bride was the recipient of many beautiful and valuable presents. The evening hours were spent very pleasantly in games of various kinds, interspersed with delightful selections of vocal and instrumental music, rendered by Mrs. Opie, Miss Millie Baird, of Boston, and Mr. Leslie Cook, of Charlottetown. As the "wee sun" hours began to dawn, the happy company dispersed. Mr. and Mrs. Bryen leaving for their new home amidst plentiful showers of rice.
