THE ARRAS—The C. G. S. Arras, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon from Picton. The Arras is one of the vessels which was built during the war for naval patrol work in Canada in 1917 and named after battles in which the Canadians participated. The Arras is now engaged in the fishery and light-house supply service. She is 130 feet long by 22 feet wide and has a speed of 11 knots per hour. Picton is this vessel's headquarters and it has been suggested that if the C. G. S. Stanley is not available for service on the Picton-Charlottetown route for Exhibition week, that this steamer though not nearly so large, would nevertheless help considerably in moving the heavy passenger traffic.

EGG LAYING CONTEST.—The pen of Barred Rocks, owned by Mr. T. B. Millman, Kensington, leads for the 43rd week of the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest, conducted by the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown. This is for the week ending August 27th. Mr. Millman's pen produced 57 eggs, 1 hen laying 7 eggs, 3 laid 6 eggs, 2 laid 5 eggs and 1 laid 4. The next pen for the week was that owned by Mr. J. S. Moar, Summerville, (Barred Rocks), with 55 eggs, the third pen was owned by Mr. P. L. Campbell, New Glasgow, P. E. I., with 53 eggs. The White Leghorn pen of Mrs. R. W. Bulpitt, Carleton Place, with 52 eggs. The next pen, with 1250 eggs, is the Charlottetown Experimental Station is second, with 1112 eggs.

Wrangel Driving Bolsheviki Back

(Special to The Guardian.) CONSTANTINOPLE, September 7.—General Wrangel's counter offensive in the Crimean sector is progressing favorably, according to dispatches received here today. He is reported to have thrown the Bolsheviki back upon the Dnieper River and to have re-occupied Melitopol (in the province of Taurida 140 miles east of Kerson). The dispatches admitted a Bolshevik success in the Province of Kuban which compelled Wrangel to abandon Ekaterinodar.
