The Weeks' Bursary

A recent copy of "The United Churchman" published at Sackville contains the following interesting reference to the Mt. Allison Campaign for one million dollars.

Salisbury - The objective for this circuit in connection with the Mt. Allison Campaign was \$2210. The amount subscribed was \$2242.

It is only fair however, to notice that \$550 of this fine total came from the Parsonage. Even then almost \$1700 goes entirely to the credit of the circuit. At the Colpitts appointment, nine families - all Colpitts, subscribed \$1900; one of the number giving \$500. The Salisbury appointment subscribed the fine total of over \$650. The balance came from Coverdale.

It is worthy of notice that \$1000 from the Colpitts folks, will likely set up what will be known as "The Colpitts Scholarship," the purpose of which has not yet been decided upon.

The subscription from the Parsonage will secure a bursary to be known as the "E. S. Weeks' bursary." This will likely be for the benefit of Prince Edward Island students, or Island-born students. The definite purpose will appear in next year's Mt. A. Calendar.

During the whole campaign a very large percentage of those approached responded most willingly, and it was a pleasure to call upon them and present the case for Mt. Allison.

Mr. Weeks is a native of Fredericton and held four parishes in this Province. The last being at Murray Harbor.
