EARLY ARRIVAL.—The schr. "Charles Haskell" arrived in Souris from Pictou Monday bound to Magdalen Islands, laden with salt, fishing supplies, gasoline and 10 passengers. The Capt. Jacob Trenholm reports no ice to be seen.—S.

REV. ROBERT LANG DEAD.—Rev. Robert Lang, for many years President of the Halifax Ladies' College, passed away last Saturday afternoon at his home, 4 Harvey street, Halifax. The sad news will be received with the deepest regret by many citizens in this province.

ARRIVED AT HALIFAX.—Lieut. Edwin Smith, R.N.V.R., arrived at Halifax, on the S. S. Olympic, Thursday morning and proceeded to Toronto. Lieut. Smith has been in command of one of His Majesty's ships for three years and has served in the North coast and in the Mediterranean. Just before leaving England he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society. It is remembered that he was formerly a Presbyterian minister at Cardigan, P. E. I.

BACK FROM FRANCE.—Signaller Leo B. McCourt, youngest son of the Editor of the Charlottetown Watchman arrived in Halifax on Sunday and proceeded with his unit to Ottawa. He enlisted at Ottawa with the Fourth Pioneer Battery of Ontario three years ago and was engaged in the engineering service in France until a year ago when he was transferred to the Signalling Service. It is pleasing to state that he has come through the great struggle without the slightest injury.

NORTHUMBERLAND SERVICE.—The Northumberland, it is understood will leave Pt. de Chene, on arrival at P. E. Island at 5 p.m. on arrival of a train leaving Moncton at 3.40. This arrangement the same mail passenger connection will be made. It has heretofore been made by the Car Ferry, Mail, and passengers come by the Ocean Limited from Montreal, and also by the G. P.
