Rotarians Hosts Agricultural Representatives

eloquent address on the quality necessary for leadership was given at Rotary luncheon yesterday. Rev. Dr. Coady of Antigonish, N. S. Shelton Sharp presided. Rotarians having as their representatives officers of the Poultry Association, Live Stock Farmers' Institute, Live Stock Dealers, Provincial Dairywomen's Association, the Federal Live Stock Association, and other visitors, who were welcomed and introduced by Mr. J. W. Boulter. Mr. Sharp announced that Mr. W. M. Lea was to have the speaker but was regretted as the doctor had advised him not to address public occasions. At the eleventh hour he persuaded Dr. Coady to address the meeting. Mr. Coady, as Hon. Mr. Sharp pointed out, is particularly well known to people of this province. He came to the University of St. Francis Xavier from the Urban School, Borneo. In 1914 and 1915 he received education at the Catholic University of America. He organized the teachers of Nova Scotia and founded and edited for the last four years the Bulletin of the Maritime Union. He then became interested in rural work and built the Model School at Margaree, P. E. I. In 1929 he was engaged by the Federal Department of Fisheries to organize the fishermen of the Maritimes and his work resulted in the setting up of the United Maritime Fishermen. In 1930 he undertook work for the Extension Department of St. Francis Xavier and since that time has been doing a wonderful work, not only with the rural population of Nova Scotia but in the mining sections as well. The luncheon was held in the main dining room of the Canadian National Hotel. The musical program comprised a vocal solo by Mr. Martin Power, of Mermaid, who was warmly endorsed. Rev. Dr. Coady defined a leader as a man who has struck the popular imagination in such a way that he can do what he wants to do; "and if he cannot do it no one else can." Such leadership required superior intelligence, an inscrutable demeanor, physiognomy, sound principles and a positive philosophy. The masses of mankind today are demanding sound justice. They see one arrow pointing straight to Communism, another to Socialism. Many of us who decry Socialism and Communism have no positive viewpoint of our own; we rest on negative condemnation. "We have a right," Dr. Coady said earnestly, "to ask of any man what he stands for; mere negatives will not do." The true leader must also know when to make a virtue of compromise. "The holier-than-thou fellow who steers straight ahead regardless of consequence and the opinions of others" was unlikely to lead successfully this world, whatever he might achieve in the next, the speaker remarked. Above all, Dr. Coady insisted, honesty and integrity were essential to true leadership.

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LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, March 8.—There were 102 cattle, 288 calves, 343 hogs and 120 lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. 1231 cattle were received at the yards for export to Great Britain via Saint John and Halifax. Of this amount 107 cattle are to sail on the S. S. Scotia, 518 on the S. S. Atlantic and 406 on the Manchester Commerce. In addition, a shipment of 232 cattle left last week for Halifax to sail tomorrow on the S. S. Salsaria. Cattle were mostly common to medium cows and fair to good quality steers. There were no early sales. Calves were easier, selling at about steady prices to a possible 25 cents lower. The bulk of the sales was made between 4 1/2 and 4 3/4 with an odd sale up to \$6. Hogs were stronger. One load brought \$7.75 and the balance of the hogs were sold at \$4.85, fed and watered. Sows were \$3.25 to \$3.50.

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Vehicle Act Passes House In Committee

Much Discussion On Merits Of Statute, Which Is In Line With Regulations In All Other Provinces.

Provincial Legislature, March 8. The House met at 3:45 p. m. Answers to some questions were tabled. Hon. Mr. McPhee presented a petition from Norman J. Nicholson and others for an Act to incorporate the King's County Hospital. A bill in accord with the petition was received and read a first time. Hon. Dr. MacMillan tabled the annual report of the Medical Superintendent of Falconwood Hospital. On motion of Hon. Dr. MacMillan, the House resumed committee reading, with Mr. Strong in the chair, of "The Public Vehicle Act." The Act provides that no person shall conduct upon a highway by means of a public vehicle, the business of a public carrier of passengers, or passengers and freight, unless licensed to do so by the Department of the Provincial Treasurer. "Public Vehicle" is defined as "a motor vehicle operated by or on behalf of any person carrying on upon the highway the business of a public carrier of passengers, or passengers and express freight which might be carried in a passenger vehicle." Mr. Dennis asked for assurance that the bill would not apply to the hauling of freight. This assurance was given by the promoter. Mr. Lea asked if motor buses at present were granted an exclusive right. The promoter replied that at present there was open competition. Mr. Lea: "Is it the purpose of this bill to give exclusive right to certain operators of trucks?" Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "I don't think that is the intention unless conditions arise where it would be necessary to give a franchise in order to insure service. It is not the intention to restrict ordinary freight trucks." Mr. Lea: "They also carry passengers." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "Only casually." Mr. Lea: "As a convenience to the neighborhood." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "The only object of the Government is to regulate the passenger service." The promoter pointed out that objections raised by Mr. LePage on the previous day had already been raised in caucus by Mr. LePage's colleague, Mr. Bethune. Mr. McIntyre objected that the bill was giving authority to levy taxes by order-in-council, a policy to which Conservatives had objected in connection with the gasoline tax under Liberal regime. Mr. Allen objected that the bill gave too much scope to the Lieutenant Governor in Council. What was it proposing to do with men handling cream and fresh fish? These commodities were often handled by express. Where would the line be drawn between a public and a private carrier? He suggested that the acting leader of the House being a medical man and accustomed to administering "sugar-coated pills," might be giving the country a sugar coated pill in the present proposed legislation. Hon. Dr. MacMillan said he resented the insinuation of the member from Summerside, who had no reason to suppose that because he was a medical practitioner, he was not acting in good faith. Mr. Allen asked what about the Electrical Act, passed last year? Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "Was it a Government measure?" Mr. Allen: "It was enacted by the Lieutenant Governor in Council." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "Are not all Acts enacted in that way. Were you not a party to its passing?" Mr. Allen: "We objected to it." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "There is not one vote recorded on it." Mr. LePage: "We spoke against it." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "So far as your objection is concerned, you have no record to support your word. The Electrical Act was put through at the request of the Underwriters' Association. We were told that it was necessary that the legislation be passed. Mr. Dennis: "By the Government." Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "By the House. We were told that they were an ordinary set of regulations. After they were in force for some time it was found that they were too stringent and severe; and just as soon as that was drawn to the attention of the Government we rescinded the

PRODUCE

MONTREAL, March 8.—With prices rising to the highest levels since last March, butter was the highlight of trading on the Montreal produce and dairy market today. A shortage of town output, principally from Ontario points, was the main reason for the upturn. A tightening up of the statistical position in Canada with storage supplies decreasing and production still a month away, Carlots or less of 10 to 11 grams make gained half a cent to 25 to 25 1/2 cents a pound. To retailers, solids were quoted at 27 cents and prints at 28 cents a pound. Receipts were only four boxes. Colder weather and purchases in Toronto by Winnipeg interests which imparted strength to the Queen City market, sent Montreal egg prices a cent higher today. and that transportation of passengers imposed special obligations which it was the duty of the Legislature to see were properly carried out. The bill would not exclude motor truck drivers who were not "passenger carriers" under the Act from carrying an odd passenger for hire. The law defining "passenger carrier" was a long-settled one and applied only to persons who were specifically engaged in the business of carrying passengers. Mr. Allen asked if a taxi cab was a public carrier. Mr. Arsenault replied that a taxi driver may be either a public or private carrier. Discussion continued by Mr. T. A. Campbell, Hon. Mr. McPhee, and Mr. Lea. Mr. J. A. MacDonald agreed with Mr. LePage that the bill be held over for a few days, for consideration. Hon. Dr. MacMillan pointed out that the Act was in operation in all the other Provinces. It had been placed on their statute books only after several fearful accidents had occurred. After some further discussion Sec. I defining the terms in the Act, passed. Sec. 2, the essential section, passed on a standing division 14-12. The remaining clauses passed unchallenged and the bill was reported agreed to without amendment. On motion of Hon. Mr. MacLean the House went into committee with Mr. Hunter in the chair on an act to incorporate the Souris Skating Rink Company Ltd. It was agreed to without amendment. The House adjourned until 3 p.m. Thursday.
