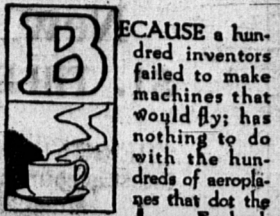

GERMAN COUNTER ATTACK REPULSED

LONDON, August 11.—The Germans attempted to relieve the situation in Picardy and in Soissons-Rheims region by making an attack in force in Flanders, south of Ypres. The point selected was Kemmel between St. Eloi and Wytschacte, names now familiar to all Canadians. Though the attack was particularly strenuous and at times savage, the British repulsed it, driving the enemy back to their own lines with heavy losses.

Put grape leaves on top. Boil equal parts of vinegar and water and pour over the top. These pickles will be ready to use in about two weeks.
