THEY MADE THEIR REPAIRS IN MID-OCEAN

Crew of Steamer Do Great Feat—Ship Propeller Blades in the Middle of the Atlantic—Five Days of Terrible Strain—Crew Worked in Shifts.

BALTIMORE, April 4.—Stripped of her propeller blades in mid-ocean, the British steamer Matoppe, which has arrived here with the distinction of being the only vessel that has ever been fitted with new propeller blades on the high sea. Hitherto mechanical and marine engineers have held that it was impossible to fit blades to a stripped propeller outside the confines of a dry dock, but the officers and crew of Matoppe have demonstrated the experts were in error. The feat is one that has set the mechanical world agog, and how the comparatively inexperienced officers of the ship, aided by such of the crew as were able to handle a hammer, managed to upset the traditions of mechanics is something the engineers do not grasp fully. The Matoppe sailed from London in January on her maiden voyage, bound for Cape Town, South Africa, with a cargo of assorted merchandise worth \$1,250,000. She ran into a southeast gale in latitude 20 south and longitude 12 east, and with a crash struck something unseen—probably a submerged derelict. Control of the ship was lost at once, as the propeller did not respond to the engine. It was found the blades had been stripped from the propeller, and as a result the Matoppe drifted in the storm for 200 miles. She pitched head down into heavy seas and it was a time of peril for all on her. For five days and nights the crew struggled against appalling odds to fit two of the propeller blades which had been held in reserve on the ship. It was necessary to raise the stern of the vessel so as to reach the propeller shaft. To accomplish this 800 tons of cargo were carried from the after hold to the forward deck and piled there so as to drive the Matoppe's nose into the ocean. This was attended with great danger, for the sea was running high, but the crew was a desperate one and Captain W. S. Smith decided to take the chance. When the stern was lifted men were let down on a staging to guide the blades into position. The blades themselves were lowered by means of tackle pieces. Each blade weighed two and a half tons, and the task, as may be seen, was extremely hazardous. The men were frequently washed from the stage, but ropes about their waists saved them. They worked in shifts of half a dozen, changing as each shift became exhausted. At the end of the fifth day the blades were shipped and secured and the Matoppe bore away for Cape Town, footing it lightly as if triumphing over the sea which had been her master for so many anxious days and nights. From Cape Town she sailed for this port, arriving with a proud complement of officers and men.

SALVATION SOLDIERS HEAR MISS EVA BOOTH

Clad as Shepherdess and Carrying Crook She Addressed Army; Booth-Tucker Coming.

New York, April 1.—The Academy of Music was crowded to the doors at the three large meetings held there by the Salvation Army in celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of its activity in the United States. The meeting in the forenoon was conducted by Col. E. J. Higgins, Chief Secretary of the Salvation Army for America. A meeting in the afternoon and another at night were conducted by Commissioner Eva Booth, a daughter of Gen. Booth, who has charge of the work in this country. At the night service, when Miss Booth spoke on the topic "The Good Shepherd," she appeared on the stage, which had been fitted in a flowing robe of Oriental material, which was intended to represent the garb of an Eastern shepherdess in Biblical times. Her feet were sandaled, she carried a shepherd's crook, and was escorted by eight children in scarlet robes carrying shepherd's crooks and lanterns. Two of the little ones were Miss Booth's adopted children, Pearl and William. The latter sang a duet which was greeted with great applause by the audience. In the afternoon Miss Booth's topic was "The Song of the City."

"I have one great challenge against the music of the world," she said. "One great challenge against the music of the ballroom, the theatre, the concert, and the opera—it does not last, it dies away. "The world's music takes its keynote from within instead of from without, and as I listen to it I listen in vain for the faintest echo denoting immortality. Our music—the music of the Church—takes its keynote from the immortal song of the Redeemer before the Throne of God. Our music makes the heart strong to resist evil and to bear sorrow. "At the end of each meeting penitents came forward and accepted religion. It was announced in Salvation Army headquarters in Fourteen Street that Commander Booth-Tucker, who until recently was in command of the Salvation Army forces in this country, would arrive on the North German Lloyd steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse for a tour of inspection of the Salvation Army farm colonies in this country, which he will make with Rider Haggard. Mr. Haggard is now in the west. The British Government, it is understood, asked that Commander Booth-Tucker undertake the tour because he founded the colonies and is thoroughly familiar with all the economic and administrative details in connection with them. Rider Haggard is seeking information with a view of utilizing it in colonization schemes the British Government entertains for South Africa.




