ANOTHER NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY TO BE BUILT.

HALIFAX, June 27—A contract between the Nova Scotia government and the Halifax & Eastern Railway Company was signed this afternoon for the building of 204 miles of railway from Halifax to Guysboro, with a branch across the province from Nova Glasgow to Cansu Harbor on the Atlantic seaboard.

The enterprise has been promoted by J. B. Bartram, of Toronto, and the company is composed chiefly of London capitalists. T. B. Pogg, lately of the Toledo Terminal Railway, is the general manager. One of the London financiers is Zsigmond Fusch and the others belong to what is known as the South African group.

This road will be completed within three years. It has subsidies from the provincial and dominion governments of \$12,800 a mile. The same people have purchased the Dieble and other timber areas in Nova Scotia, amounting to 440,000 acres, paying over \$3 an acre for the property.

The capital of each company is \$3,000,000, a holding company with a capital of \$6,000,000 holds the bonds and stocks of the railway and the lumber companies.

The Royal Bank of Canada receives about \$1,000,000 for a claim they had on the Dieble limits, which partly accounts for a recent advance of five points in the value of the stock of that bank.

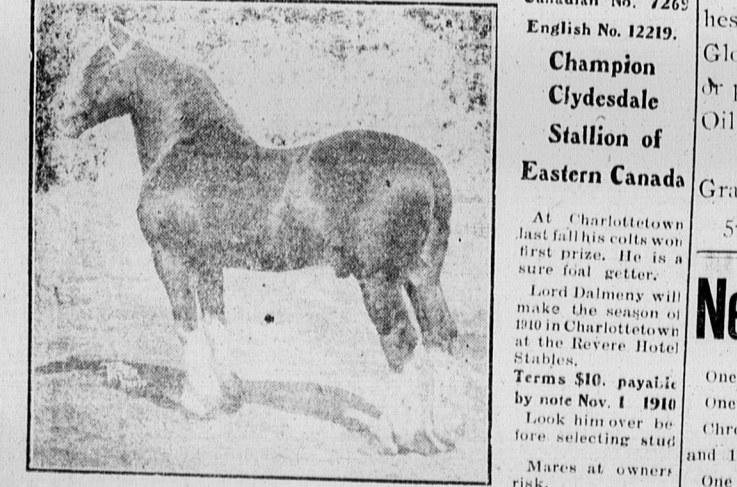
