The dairy meeting which was to have been held at Freetown on Wednesday evening, March 15th, has been postponed till a later date, as Mr. Mitchell is to speak at an agricultural meeting in connection with the Central Seed Fair, Charlottetown, on Wednesday evening.

A Glynde River correspondent writes:—The farmers around Glynde River have all done hawking their firewood and now mud digging is the order of the day. William M. Doyle and Charles Todd of Bradabane have been at Glynde River with their gasoline engine cutting firewood for the farmers and they are giving good satisfaction. They cut fifty-seven cords for K. Gunn, twenty-one cords for James Turner, and sixteen cords for James Cousins. Beat that, who can?—Alfred Parsons is training his young Woodburn colt which promises to be quite a speedy one.

The Canadian Magazine for March contains an article on The Surrender of Poundmaker, by Major C. F. Winter, of the Canadian Militia, an eye witness of that interesting event. He gives an abridged account of the whole negotiations. The article is well illustrated. Teaching the Farmer How to Farm, is the somewhat pretentious title of an article by Donald G. French which proves to be a comprehensive account of what the Ontario Department of Agriculture is doing towards helping the farmers of the Province to farm scientifically. Other articles of more than passing interest are What is the Empire? by Hon. William Renwick Riddell, Canadian Collector and Modern Dutch Art, by E. P. B. Johnston, K. C., The Magdalen Islands (second article), by W. Lacy Amy, The Soul of a Canadian City, by T. Sharper Knowlton, with short stories by Isabel Eccleston Mackay and L. M. Montgomery.

The Marshfield Farmers' Institute met within the hall in regular meeting last Saturday night. A goodly number were in attendance and were favored with a healthful and very instructive address on Poultry by Seth Jones of the Agriculture Department of New Brunswick, a well known poultry judge. The speaker held the close attention of his hearers for over two and a half hours in giving facts and figures that cannot be disputed he clearly showed the demand for poultry products is greater than ever before, stating that millions of eggs would need to be produced before there would be any surplus of egg product to export to foreign markets, further stating that all the egg products of Canada 25 per cent. becomes unit for use before it reaches the consumer, therefore showing how essential it is for farmers, through co-operation, to establish a better system of handling the egg product by which the producer will be brought into closer business transactions with the consumer. He then spoke on the three essentials of raising poultry, namely, breeding, housing and feeding. On these subjects he gave some very forceful points. In conclusion he showed by figures the cost per dozen of producing eggs, also cost per pound of raising chickens and the grand profit that may be realized in the sale of same, thus convincing his hearers that no line of farm business will give as large a profit as that of poultry. Miss Florence M. McLeod, of the Charlottetown Business College, has returned to the city, after a very pleasant visit with her parents Alex and Mrs. McLeod of Surrey.

A desecration of the Sabbath in the form of a series of wrestling contests occurred on Sunday afternoon at Brighton Shore on the north side of the first range light. Those participating had seconds appointed to see fair play and quite a large crowd, who cheered the combatants vociferously, gathered to witness the proceedings.

The Phoenix hockey team of Phoenix, B.C., under the captainship of Herbert Neill, son of James Neill of this city, has made a most brilliant record this season, having played eleven games without sustaining one defeat. They scored a total of 79 goals in these eleven games while but four were scored against them. Their victories have brought to them the Boundary hockey league championship cup, the British Columbia hockey championship shield and the International cup, emblematic of the championship of British Columbia and the State of Washington. Individuals gold medals accompanied all the prizes. As the result of their record showing the team have challenged for the Stanley Cup. It is five years since Neill left Charlottetown. When not playing hockey he is engaged in mining and is doing well.

The body of Dr. P. P. Nichols, who died in Bermuda on Monday last, left New York Thursday night for Seaport (Me.) and the funeral will take place there either today or tomorrow. E. W. McCready, manager of The Telegraph and Times, went to New York to meet Mrs. Nichols on her arrival from Bermuda with the remains. The Boston Commercial says: "News of the death of Dr. P. P. Nichols, a native of Seaport, Mass., has been received. Dr. Nichols has been an invalid for some time and went to Bermuda for his health. A few weeks ago his wife joined him there, as he had grown rapidly worse. Mrs. Nichols was expected to arrive in New York Thursday with the remains and they will be brought to Seaport, where they will be entombed until spring, when interment will be made in the family lot."—St. John Telegraph, March 11.—(The late Dr. Nichols is a son-in-law of Mr. McCready, Editor of The Guardian.)

LATEST MOVE IN FIGHT FOR THE EDDY FORTUNE

CONCORD, N. H., Mar. 10—Another move was made in the legal controversy over the will of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy by the filing by George W. Baker of Concord, N. H., a nephew of Mrs. Eddy, in the Superior Court of Merrimack county, of a motion for leave to intervene in the suit of Mrs. Eddy's son, G. O. W. Glover, of Lead, S. D., against the trustees of her estate. The motion, of which notice was given several weeks ago, prays also that George W. Glover be enjoined from continuing the litigation.

The motion does not come as an entire surprise to those interested in the case, George W. Baker having on Feb. 12 given notice that he would file a petition to be allowed to intervene as next of kin, at which time the same declarations were made against the validity of the will and the legal standing of George W. Glover as entitled to share in the estate. The motion, which is a document of about 1200 words, recites the facts as to the death of Mrs. Eddy, and the subsequent filing of her will, the suit of George W. Glover and others against General Henry M. Baker of Bow, N. H., and the other executors, based on a claim that the will is invalid because of the terms of the residuary clause.

REFORM TO COME AFTER VETO BILL

LONDON, March 10—In a speech at the National Liberal club tonight Winston Spencer Churchill, home secretary, indicated the government's plan for the reform of the house of lords. He said it would be useless to propose reform while the house of lords was possessed of the power of veto, but when the veto was abolished it was contemplated to substitute for the existing obsolete second chamber a body more or less evenly constituted whose balance should be preserved from year to year by some effective perennial contact with and relating to public opinion and the popular will.
