### NO CANADIAN FREE TRADERS.

J. A. Hobson, a well known English economist who has returned from a visit to Canada, writes to the London Chronicle that there is "no free trade party, no free trade sentiment anywhere in Canada, even among the Liberals". This Mr. Hobson deplores, and he is also somewhat amazed at our want of sound views on the trade question. He is about right in his conclusion that there are very few free traders in Canada.

Every country must have some system of taxation for raising a revenue. The Canadian people are pretty generally committed to raising the necessary revenue by duties upon certain classes of imported goods. We place no taxes upon exports except in a few rare instances. And it is in the nature of things that duties upon manufactured goods brought into the country, be those duties high or low, operate as a protection for home manufactures of the same sort.

Just here there are wide differences of opinion among the Canadian people. There are many who believe in a tariff for revenue only. With these the revenue is the sole object. Some of them think the protective feature of no real value, but these are probably in a minority among the "revenue tariff" men. A tariff for revenue affording incidental protection in the real belief of the many. They would have the tariff framed solely to meet the requirements of the revenue, but think the moderate protection thus afforded is a good thing.

The protectionists form another class. They are believers in the principle of protection, for the sake of keeping the home market for home manufacturers, thus, as they think, keeping money in the country, affording employment to our own people at home, and by thus fostering home industries providing new and lucrative sources of wealth. With these men the revenue is a secondary consideration. They think it a good thing that the tariff produces revenue, but have no hesitation in approving a tariff so high that it will produce less revenue than a lower tariff. Of this we have many instances.

There is no doubt that by slightly lowering the tariff Mr. Fielding has made it much more productive of revenue than the previous tariff. The volume of imports has enormously increased under the new order of things. But still, as Mr. Hobson says, there are no free-traders in Canada—that is there are none who would make all imports free of duty and raise the necessary revenue by direct taxation. Even the British system of so-called free-trade, is not free trade at all. Free trade would mean that goods should be left untaxed by duties in Britain or by duties in the country to which they are sent. Such free trade is impossible until other countries adopt the principle.

Obviously Britain's trade with other nations is not free trade in the sense of free trade as it exists between the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, or between the Provinces of Canada, or the States of the American Union. British free trade is a misnomer. Free imports would better express the existing conditions, although even this limited phrase expresses more than the truth. All imports to the United Kingdom are not free of duty. Spirits, wines, tobacco, and dried fruits are heavily taxed at the custom house, though the object is not protection, but revenue. All raw

materials, manufactured goods and most food stuffs are admitted free. After all Britain and Canada are not so very far apart in trade principles. Britain taxes a few imports and Canada taxes many, and in both cases revenue is the prime object.

The tides prove to be quite an interesting topic these times. Capt. Joseph Read writes The Patriot that "the tides as we know them are due almost entirely to the action of the moon and sun," and adds that "so far as the battle has gone between The Guardian and Mr. Doull the former has by long odds the better of it, although Mr. Doull has demonstrated great ability." Capt. Read has watched the tides from the deck in all the seven seas and ought to know something about them. Just now he is very busy but when he has more leisure he proposes to explain certain things in connection with the tides which have escaped the scientists. When he does so many will be interested. Another correspondent of The Patriot dealing with the subject confesses to being afflicted with water on the brain.

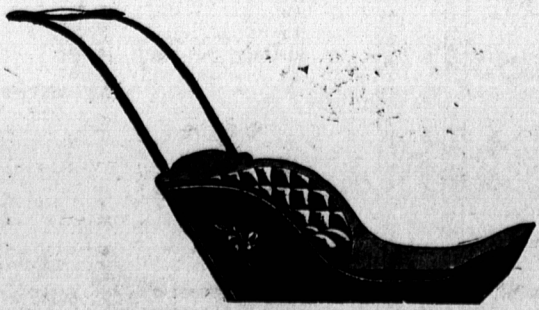
