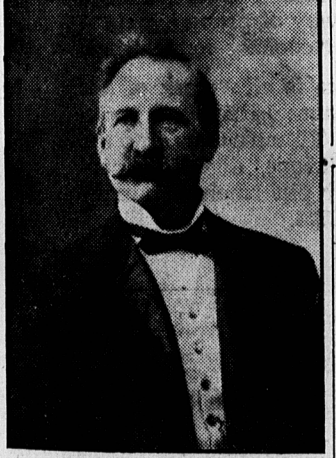
ARRESTS IN DYNAMITE CONSPIRACY

Heavy Vote Cast Yesterday When Ballots First Introduced in Civic Elections—All Old Councillors Returned—Close Contests.

In the adjacent columns is given the result of the civic elections of yesterday. The polling was held under most favorable weather conditions, the entire day being fine and mild. For the first time in Charlottetown's municipal history the voting in a civic election was by ballot and the system received a hearty commendation on all sides as one of the outstanding monuments of the late council.

The contest in every way was keen. There was a three-cornered fight for Mayoralty, the first in the history of the city, contests in each ward with two candidates each in Wards One, Two and Three, three in Ward Four and six in Ward Five. There were five candidates for Water Commissioners.

The Mayoralty election was a signal victory for Charles Lyons over James Paton and S. A. McDonald. Mr. Lyons had 63 votes less than his two opponents combined. When defeated by Mayor Rogers in 1910 he obtained 1126 with two opponents. The total vote in 1910 was 2145 and in 1912, 2315, an increase of 170. Mr. Lyons led in every ward and in each of the polls but three.

McCarron, of last year's board being defeated by about 100 votes. The contest was exceedingly close, each candidate polling 1000 votes and there being only 37 votes difference in the first three. The ballots, on the whole, were carefully written, out of the 2000 or more cast there being but 33 rejected. There were appointed to the Wards as follows:—One east—5, Two east—1, Two west—2, Four Central—5, Five east—2, Five east central—16, Five west central—2. One party voted for all three mayorality candidates, several for four councillors, one for four Water Commissioners, one had a pencil mark through several of the spaces for the cross and a number had two strokes for a cross which did not connect as well as other marks besides the cross.

TAFT NEGOTIATING A RECIPROCAL TREATY WITH THE CUBANS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12—President Taft, it was reported today, has begun the negotiation of a new reciprocity treaty with Cuba. Secretary of State Knox has held a number of conferences with Senor Rivero, the Cuban minister, as to the Cuban minister, as to the drafting of a new convention, especially in connection with the duties on sugar. The Cuban minister declined today to discuss his activity in this regard, but it is understood that Cuba expects the present sugar duties to be diminished and feels there may be a necessity for a readjustment of the preferential rates given the public.

KING'S SPEECH OF YESTERDAY

Promises Home Rule Bill and Disestablishment of Church in Wales

(Canadian Press). LONDON, Feb. 14—The second session of the first parliament of King George's reign was opened today by King George in person with all the time-honored picturesque ceremony which always marks such occasions. The speech from the throne was awaited with absorbing public interest and the King himself showed that he realized the momentousness of the occasion by the emphasis he laid the more salient clauses of the address while speaking. Blank disappointment was however, read in the faces of his hearers over the colorlessness of the King's reference to the historic legislation mapped out by the Government. The speech was a short one. Referring to the measures to be brought before Parliament the King said: "A measure for the better government of Ireland will be submitted to you. A bill will be laid before you to terminate the establishment of the Church in Wales and make provision for the temporalities. A proposal will be brought forward for the amendment of the law with respect to the franchise and legislative electors."

IMMIGRANTS ARE DETAINED FOUR MONTHS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—Marissie Tipschity, of Russian immigrant, who was detained with her mother at Halifax for two months, will have a third opportunity to prove her eligibility for admission to this country. The case involves separation from her mother and a daughter who is dead from her father and six brothers and sisters in Chicago. The physicians declare the girl an imbecile. She will be taken to Ellis Island, N. Y., for examination.
