Neither was there a chance for Canada to ship her surplus elsewhere, except for a small market in South America. Meanwhile, Canada will attempt to keep the United States market open "as much as possible" for Canadian seed potatoes. The Dominion's supply of table potatoes was not wanted in the U. S. but prospects for continuing large shipment of seed potatoes were good.

The source said the ban on shipment of Canadian table potatoes across the border as affecting the retail prices across the country. The Canadian retail price was expected to drop still lower in 1949.
