wealth, the forests, the streams, the fertile soil, the climate which produced hardy men and women who the climate that Germany required in order to people them with German assassins. Were they going to stand by while this terrible unthinkable thing was sought to be carried out? He would gladly give the remaining years of his life if he could give one year of his life to his country. Our artillery men had surprised the men of all Canada in that particular branch of warfare.

The Veteran's song was then sung by Mr. L. McInnis, and Mr. B. H. Ruckham, a native of Fredericton, gave a few words of appeal and said that there were many young men in Fredericton who would look as well in the King's uniform as any in Charlottetown.

After a reading by Captain Shaw, Lieut. Allan, a member of the Battery, said that they needed 100 more men to fill the company and he hoped that when that day came they would be able to raise a still larger unit. One of the best men they had was Sergeant Stevenson. He hoped that more young men would come with them.

Professor Barlow then delighted the audience with "Up from Somerset" and "A chip of the old block."

Captain Campbell followed. He stated the splendid opportunities that enlistment offered to both single and married men. They had some of the very best men in P. E. Island in their ranks. The fact that the Empire was engaged in a life and death struggle could not be hidden. The real object of Germany was to destroy the British Empire. There was no part of that Empire that Germany coveted so much as Canada. If the brave men fighting for us were beaten, as sure as they were alive Canada was beaten. If we failed in our duty our children in the long generations to come would curse us as traitors. The men who went to the front would never be sorry.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

## AT BRADALBANE.

A largely attended recruiting meeting was held in Bradalbane last evening when, as the result of the eloquent and stirring appeals of the various speakers, five recruits were enlisted. A special train left Charlottetown at a quarter past six and conveyed passengers from several stations. The 4th Regiment Band was in attendance and furnished excellent music, which undoubtedly helped to make the meeting the success it was.

The meeting was presided over by Rev. R. G. Fulton, while there were also present on the platform Rev. G. C. Taylor, Rev. D. McLean, Mr. Alexander Martin, ex-M.P., Hon. Murdoch Kennedy, Mr. Sinclair, Major Leigh and others. The hall was crowded to the doors, and outside there was also quite an audience. A splendid musical and literary programme, which was very highly appreciated, was contributed by the band, Mr. A. B. Cash, Bandsman Acorn and Gunner O'Rourke and Mr. Peake, Prof. J. T. Thompson acting as accompanist in his brilliant style. The addresses were all as eloquent, forceful and effective as they could possibly be.

Rev. Mr. Fulton, in opening the meeting, explained briefly the dire necessity at the present moment for men, and said that he was sure the people of Bradalbane, who he had no doubt were as patriotic as those of any other part of the country, would respond to the urgent call which was being made. He then introduced Rev. Mr. Taylor.

Mr. Taylor, in an address which could not be surpassed for eloquence and patriotic fervour, stated that one-fifth of the men at the front to-day are of Scotch descent, and he appealed to the people of Bradalbane, who were so largely Scotch, to come forward and uphold the traditions of the race. Canada, he said, had been very well represented at the great Exhibition at San Francisco, and to-day the nations of the world were gathered together in a greater exhibition—the exhibition of the manhood of the world, and he would be ashamed if Canada did not measure up to the highest in that great exhibition. He did not think that Canadians were afraid to do their duty; he thought that they had not yet awakened to the great necessity that existed for men. "Canada," he said, "must enter into her place among the nations of the world, and she must do so, as all other nations have done, by the shedding of blood." If the British Empire is to be victorious, it will only be through every man and every woman doing their part. He concluded with a strong appeal for recruits.

Hon. Murdoch Kennedy, in a few remarks, urged on the young men to come to the aid of their country and Empire in its hour of grave crisis.

Mr. Alexander Martin pointed out the seriousness of the situation and emphasised the importance of the call. He said that there was nothing grander and more heroic and patriotic than for a man to do his duty in the present hour of danger. "Britons

never shall be slaves"—If every man will take advantage of the priceless privilege which is his to-day and do his duty. "Don't be afraid," he concluded. "If you have any British blood in you, boys, come on and enlist. The time may come when, if you don't go willingly now, you will have to go by force. Britain will not be conquered so long as she has a drop of blood left in her veins!" Mr. Sinclair then addressed the audience briefly, pointing out the danger in which the Empire is situated to-day and emphasizing the urgency for recruits. Lieut. Stanway also made an excellent appeal. Rev. D. McLean, in a magnificent oration, reminded the audience of all that Britain had done, in her centuries of history, for the welfare of civilization and for every art of the Empire, and he made a powerful and touching appeal to the manhood of the people of Bradalbane to rally round the standard and "Never let the old flag fall." Rev. Mr. Fulton, the chairman, made the closing speech, which was visibly effective. He said in the first place that he was not appealing Scotchmen, or Englishmen, or Irishmen or Frenchmen, but to BRITONS! (Cheers). Every Briton should realize that, and throwing aside all consideration of religious step forward and do the right thing in the circumstances. He urged them all to act the part of men. They should all be loyal to themselves and loyal to the traditions of the Empire and to the heritage which had been bequeathed them at untold sacrifice; and they could not be loyal unless they manfully and honourably responded to the call of the colours. His address was a noble one. At the close of the meeting five sturdy young men went up to the platform and enlisted. The meeting closed with the hearty singing of the National Anthem.

## PEOPLE'S THEATRE

There was good variety in the big budget of film stories screened at the People's Theatre last evening. The first film pictured the Fall manoeuvres of the Swedish army.
