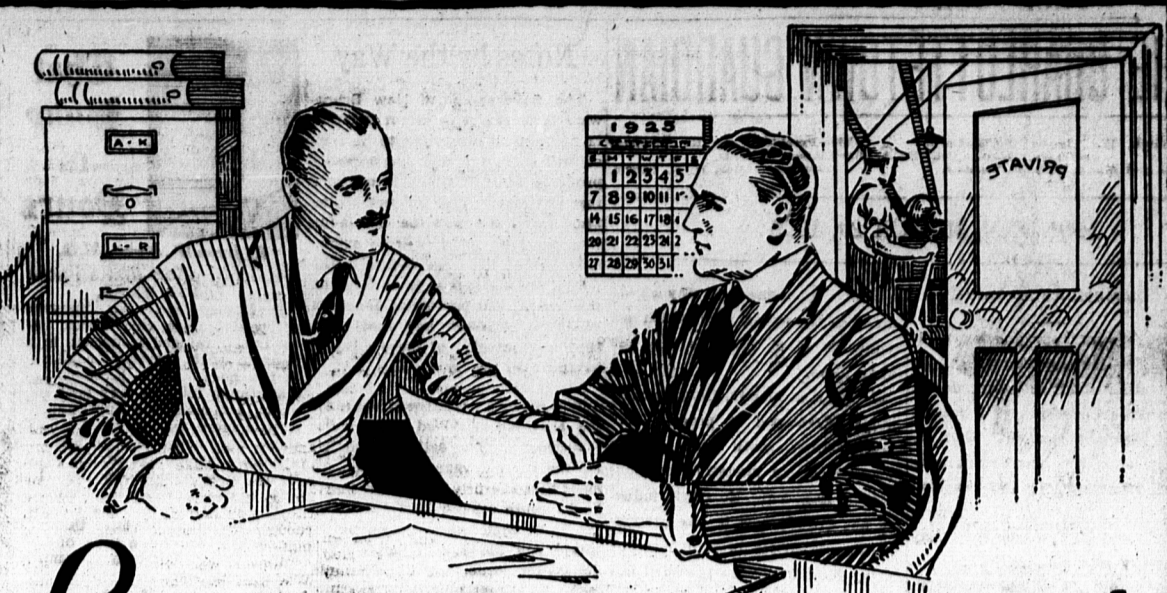

Mr. Dennis presented a bill to incorporate the Mount Pleasant Church of the Nazarene. Hon. Mr. McPhee presented a bill to amend the Act to promote the improvement of highways. On motion of Mr. J. A. McDonald the bill to incorporate the Trustees of the People's Cemetery at Mount Stewart was read a second time and committed, Mr. J. B. McDonald in the chair. The bill provides that Marion Clark, Beatrice Glover, Mattilda McAssey and Mary Elizabeth Jay, and their successors in office, shall be a body corporate by the name of the Trustees of the People's Cemetery of Mount Stewart and shall have all the general powers and privileges incident to a corporation. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments. On motion of Hon. barley and oats were 3d to 6d per quarter higher than on the previous day and sales of several old loads were made but the volume of business on the whole was small. The tone of the spot market for oats was again stronger in sympathy with the strength displayed at other centres and prices were marked up another cent per bushel. The undertone to the spring wheat and winter wheat flour markets was very firm but no change in prices were announced. Prices for all grades of millfeed were well maintained under a good demand. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was quiet and prices were steady. Butter prices were at the recent declines noted and the trade volume was fair. The cheese market was quiet and unchanged. Prices for eggs were firm at the advances noted.

Military Service Term Reduced

WARSAW, Poland, March 28.—Reduction of the military service term from two years to one is provided for in a measure which the Finance Minister will present to parliament as a means of reducing the budget and relieving the financial situation.
