AN application was made before the Master of the Rolls on Saturday last for the appointment of a Receiver against the Dominion Packing Company, Ltd. at the instance of the Royal Trust Company of Montreal. Judgment was reserved until yesterday when His Lordship refused the application. A bill has been filed by the Royal Trust Company against the Packing Company to foreclose a mortgage and bonds and it was sought to have a Receiver appointed pending the finding in the case. A. E. Lings of Peters, Peters & Lings appeared for the complainants and C. G. Duffy of Morson & Duffy for the D. P. Company.

R. E. Mutch & Co have accepted the P. E. I. agency for one of the largest pork packing houses in the Upper Provinces and will begin at once shipping to that establishment. The firm is able to handle a car load a day at the present time. It is hoped that this will give a boom to the pork market here.  
REV. FATHER BURKE, at the invitation of Manager Lockhart, went through the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Company's establishment yesterday and was much impressed with the system employed and the milk and coffee products put up. The only pity is that the milk should be in a dairy province like this.  
CHARLOTTETOWN will shortly boast of a female physician, Dr. Eliza McKenzie of Flat River who graduated last year with honors at Dalhousie and since took a course in one of the leading American hospitals, intends in a few days to open an office in this city. This departure will be quite an innovation in Island medical circles and will, doubtless, be received with favor by many.  
THE Government has been brought from Quebec arrives each evening in from one to three car load lots each by the Princess and the Northumberland and is being distributed from Summerside and Charlottetown to smaller centres throughout the Province. The prices charged are from \$10.00 to \$10.50 cash according to quality. To-day a shipment will be made by City of London to Belfast.  
MANY will hear with deep regret of the death Sunday of Nelson Clarke, aged 68 years, a prominent and highly respected farmer and road inspector of Cape Traverse. Deceased who had previously been in good health was stricken with paralysis on Saturday and the end came soon. There are left to mourn two sons Wilfred in Colorado and Ernest in Springfield Mass; and two daughters Gertrude and Mary at home. To the bereaved ones the sympathy of many will go out.  
A HALIFAX Despatch says that characters were arrested at New Annan last week and are now in Truro jail. They had enough nitro glycerine to blow up the town - fuses, revolvers etc. They gave their names as Johnson and Burns. The former is from Pietou. Burns is of florid complexion, between 26 and 30 years of age, weighs 175 lbs and has two months beard as well as mustache, he has a roppy eye and stammers.
