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Redmen Fall Before Mighty Hawks

Champions Have Two Goal Margin For Second Game

Famed McGill Squad Bow To Lightning-like Thrusts Of Moncton Team—Score Is 3-1

MONTREAL, March 21—The power that swept them to the Allan Cup championship last year has not deserted Moncton's high-flying Hawks. Maritime champions again, they showed too much strength for McGill University's Redmen here tonight as they beat the Quebec champions 3-1 in the first game of the interprovincial play-downs, and skated off the ice with a two-goal lead they will carry into the final game of the series Friday night.

A capacity crowd of 13,000 fans kept up a continuous roar of excitement as the speeding Hawks ran up a three-goal lead in two periods, generally outplaying the Redmen. The excitement rose to a crescendo in the final five minutes as the Redmen scored their only goal and finished with a burst of blinding speed that had the Hawks puffing badly as the bell ended the game.

Wildly Cheered
Hundreds of Maritimers shrieked themselves hoarse as the Hawks sent the collegians sprawling with rough body checks and sent lightning thrusts through the red defence for goal after goal. Thousands of McGill students and old graduates were on their feet in the last few hectic minutes as the Quebec champions ran all over the Moncton defence and blasted a terrific barrage at Jimmy Foster.

Blundered Badly
Hawks showed a world of speed, ruggedness, smooth combination play and scoring punch to earn their win. The McGill team blundered almost helplessly at all times. Their passing plays were not clicking and their shooting was indifferent. They only showed their real calibre in those last two minutes.

Bert Connolly, a former Montreal boy, rang up the first goal for Hawks with 12 minutes to play in the first period. He took a pass from Bill Miller in a scramble inside the McGill defence and blasted a hard shot straight to the back of the McGill cage making his shot with a tangle of McGill and Moncton players milling in front of the McGill goal.

Losses on the McGill defence early in the second period gave Hawks another goal. Dud James grabbed a loose puck just inside the students' blue line. He slid the puck forward to Sammy McManus, who dodged around Alan Hall and scored from just outside the goal crease.

In the last minute of the same period while Bill Gill was serving a penalty Duke McDonald trapped four McGill men up the ice. He swept down alone, worked his way around Frank Shaughnessy and blazed the puck into the trine.

Scores Lone Goal
Blond haired Jack McGill scored the lone goal for his college. Nels Crutchfield gave him the puck from a wild melee inside the Hawks defence and McGill sniped a clean cut goal from 10 feet out.

FIRST PERIOD
McGill grabbed the puck at the face-off and got a long shot at Jimmy Foster. Miller and then Irvine fired hot ones at the McGill cage from the blue line. Alan Hall, McGill defenceman, was sent off for tripping. Crutchfield and Elie headed two McGill rushes while they were short handed. Connolly skidded through for a short range try at Maurice Powers. Hall came back. Farmer got into a corner and passed to Gordie Meiklejohn right in front of the Moncton goal. Meiklejohn missed the cage. Miller went off for slashing and Bill Gill joined him for charging a moment later. The Red Raiders rushed in for a furious assault with a two-man advantage. Tommy Robertson got a pass from Farmer at the blue line and heaved a hard one at Foster's chest. Farmer got off a snap shot in the re-goal but Jimmy was ready to gain. Hawks were at full strength again. They went down on a four man rush and Powers fell to the ice in the skirmish.

SECOND PERIOD
Foster made a neat stop as Farquharson sniped through the Hawks defence. Duke McDonald need across the McGill blue line but was heavily checked by Meiklejohn. Bill Gill was stopped at the McGill blue line. Nucker L. line was held against the boards on another rush. Farmer was stopped by Gill. Bert Connolly dropped to the ice. He got up and limped to the Moncton bench. Sammy McManus put the Hawks two goals in front. Dud James gave him the pass just across the McGill blue line and Sammy curved around Alan Hall and waited right in on Powers. His shot bounced in the cage and out again. Jack McGill was chased for bumping Irvine and then Irvine joined him for swinging at Shaughnessy. Kenny Farmer blazed a high one over the top of the Moncton cage from right in front of Foster.

THIRD PERIOD
Farmer whirled down the ice but Burrage stopped him. Farmer was stopped again. Hall rushed and was spilled by Bill Gill. Nucker Irvine went down to the McGill cage but there was nobody to take his pass. Farmer and Farquharson teamed on a passing play but Gill checked Farquharson as he was about to shoot. Webster carried play into a corner at the McGill end. Shaughnessy, Crutchfield and the Hawks defence without getting a shot. McManus rocked Powers with a hot one from the left wing. Meiklejohn raced down and made Foster jump with a high backhander. Hawks were heaving the puck down the ice.
