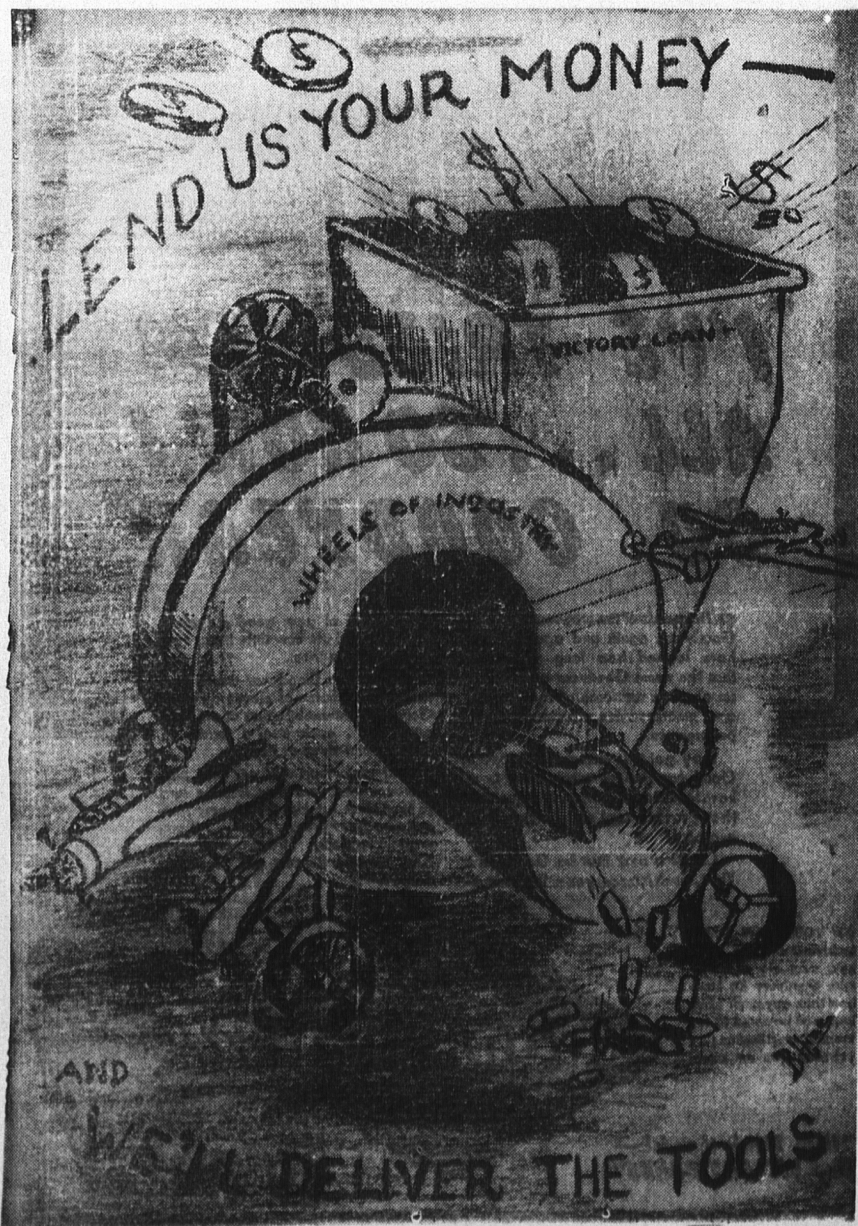

Rev. Geo. E. Ross
Noted Cleric
Ends Service

Among those officially retiring from the active ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at the meeting of the General Assembly is Rev. George E. Ross, D. D. Dr. Ross is one of the best known of the Presbyterian clergy, and has completed 45 years of active and continuous service in the ministry. He is an alumnus and gold medalist of Pictou Academy, Pictou, N.S., where, in the years before the turn of the century was a distinct honor. He graduated from Dalhousie University 1893, and from Pine Hill Theological College, Halifax, N.Z., in 1895, with the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

After a short ministry in the congregation at North West Arm and Rockingham, suburbs of Halifax, he served in the pioneer days of the church's mission to the East Indians, in British Guiana, South America, and on his return was minister in St. David's Church, Matland, N.S., and later in Zion Church, Charlottetown, P.E.I. CALLED TO GODERICH From the Island he was called to Knox Church, Goderich, Ont., and six years later he accepted a call to St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church, Montreal. Here he labored for 10 years, enjoying a strenuous and successful ministry, which he left in 1925 to build churches at Lachine and Montreal West. This accomplished Dr. Ross accepted a call to Erskine Church, Ottawa, and six years later to Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Fredericton, N.B. During his ministry in Charlott-
