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Germany Paid \$31,000,000 Gold Marks

PARIS, Jan. 18.—Germany made the first payment today of 31,000,000 gold marks, in accordance with the recent decision of the Reparations Commission at Cannes, providing for such payment every four months, pending a decision of the reparations committee.

New Zealand Institutes Economic Reform

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Jan. 18.—A Wellington New Zealand correspondent cables that Premier Massey with a view to affecting further economies in the administration of the country has introduced legislation in Parliament whereby there will be a saving of two million pounds sterling. All war bonuses are to be reduced while at public departments, including the Ministers, are to suffer a gradual reduction beginning immediately. The Premier said he anticipated a further saving of three million pounds by reforms and the readjustment of the administration.

Doctor Held for Double Murder

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 17.—Dr. R. K. McCracken, one of the most prominent physicians in Central and Southern Illinois, was arrested today at his home on Grandview Drive, Belleville, in connection with the mysterious murder on Monday last of Mrs. Clara Richwine and her father-in-law, William Richwine.

Doctor Held for Double Murder

Dr. McCracken was taken to police headquarters in East St. Louis and placed in a cell pending examination by Chief of Police Maloney and detectives. He was denied the privilege of notifying friends, and it was announced that no bond would be accepted for him. He will be held incommunicado until the police finish their investigation.

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Glack and Tans Boing to Palestine

The Colonial Office has issued a statement saying it desires to recruit 700 men for police work in Palestine and that a special effort will be made to raise this force from units such as the Irish auxiliary units now being disbanded. Republican Opposition to Irish Free State

\$1,800,000 Bond to be Offered in New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Two Canadian provincial bond issues are scheduled to be sold here on Monday. The province of New Brunswick will open bids on \$1,800,000 five to ten year bonds restricted to Canadian payment. The province of Alberta will open bids on \$2,500,000 twenty year and half's payable either in Canadian or United States currency.

RAID ON REGIMENT

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—Descending suddenly on the sergeant's mess of the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards in the O. A. C. building Saturday night, the city police squad seized all the beer in stock and took the names of a number of the men who were drinking at the time. The raid was altogether unexpected and the sergeant strongly resented the invasion, declaring that the city authorities had no jurisdiction over a military canteen.

British Cabinet Discusses Irish Transfer

Crew Were Lashed To Cabin Hatch

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—After being without food and water for two days, during which they were lashed to the cabin hatch of their waterlogged craft to keep from being washed overboard by mountainous seas, Captain V. M. Cole and seven members of the American schooner James M. Wall arrived here today on the steamship Westchester, which picked them up 250 miles south of Cape May, N. J., Friday night.

ESKIMO SKELETONS

HALIFAX, Jan. 18.—Thirty-three Eskimo skeletons arrived in Halifax from the Far North, recently for examination and measurement on behalf of the Canadian Government by Dr. John Cameron, Professor of Anatomy at Dalhousie University. The skeletons were brought from the land of snows by the Canadian Arctic expedition party, which has spent two years in Canada's frigid zone.
