

# ACTIVE YEAR FOR WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

### Annual Reports Show Much Progress In Educational And Health Activities. Annual Convention Opened Yesterday.

The first day's session of the 19th annual convention of the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island, held yesterday in the Assembly hall of Rochford Square School was attended by a large number of delegates, representing the various districts throughout the Province, and much enthusiasm was manifested in the reception of the various reports and addresses.

The morning session began at 10 o'clock with registration of members. At 11:15 Mrs. W. W. Crosby, Provincial Vice President, opened the session. A report on the Club Woman's Creed was repeated in unison, the members standing. The minutes of the 19th convention were read by Miss Les, Provincial secretary, and adopted. An interesting report on Organization and National Events was read by Mrs. John Crockett, Provincial Convener. The meeting then adjourned for noon hour.

### Much Enthusiasm At First General Meeting, At Which Constitution Is Drafted And Dr. Locke Warmly Commended For Recommending Library Grant.

The first general meeting of the Prince of Wales College Alumni Society was held yesterday afternoon in the hall of the annex to the City Building.

The President, Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, presided, and presented the following report:

#### THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The Officers and Executive Committee early in March opened up a correspondence with George H. Locke, of Toronto, Chairman of the Canadian Branch of the Carnegie Fund for Educational Institutions in British possessions outside Great Britain and asked that a grant be made to supply a library for the new college, and the reply was very encouraging.

"Prof. F. Clyde Auld, of Toronto, a member of our Executive, had several interviews, with Dr. Locke, and rendered valuable assistance."

"On April 28th matters had reached the point where Prof. Auld suggested that we ask permission for Dr. Locke to inspect the plans of the new building in the hands of the architects in Toronto. Your Executive arranged a meeting with the Premier and the Minister of Education and permission was readily granted and resulted in Dr. Locke suggesting some changes in the library rooms which were adopted."

"At the joint instance of the Alumni Society and of the Government an invitation was extended to Dr. Locke to visit Charlottetown and this he kindly consented to do. As a result of this invitation Dr. Locke while on a visit to Halifax came to Charlottetown as the guest of the Government and of the Society."

"The result of continued correspondence was that at a meeting of our Executive called by the President and held in the Council Chamber by kind permission of the Minister of Education, Dr. Locke announced he was recommending to the Carnegie Foundation that a grant of \$1,500 yearly for three years for the purchase of books for the new library be made, which

A third session was held in the evening in connection with the coincidental session of the Women's Institute convention in Rochford Square School Hall. At the conclusion of the afternoon session the farmers with the delegates of the Women's Institute enjoyed a hearty repast at the Experimental Farm.

At the morning session the report of the President Mr. J. E. Dingwell was received and discussed, and committees were appointed. At the afternoon session officers were elected and resolutions discussed and adopted.

#### Resolutions

#### Railway Service

The following resolution was moved by Mr. C. E. McKendle, seconded by Mr. Peter Brodie.

Whereas: The annual meeting of the Central Farmers' Institute of Prince Edward Island held in Charlottetown July 14, 1932, has learned with regret that the Canadian National Railway has discontinued six days a week trains on the line east of Harmony Junction since May 1st and has substituted instead two trains only on Tuesday and the other on Friday, which service is an injustice to that part of our Province and whereas that section is entirely dependent on the railway to market its products of farm and fisheries and whereas two trains a week cannot keep the line in operation under winter conditions when the people are largely dependent on it to secure the service of doctors and entirely dependent for all Hospital cases.

Therefore resolved that this meeting representative of the whole Province do hereby respectfully request the Board of Management to restore the regular services before the fall shipping season begins.

#### Marketing Board

The following resolution was moved by Mr. J. W. McLean and seconded by Mr. J. Stetson.

Whereas: at the present time the great difficulty confronting farmers is the marketing of their products to the best advantage and firmly believing in the value of co-operation. Be it therefore resolved that we the farmers here present at this annual meeting of the Central Institute approve of the establishment of a Federal Marketing Board.

#### Imperial Conference

The following resolution was moved by Mr. W. D. Ross, seconded by Mr. C. D. Taylor.

Whereas: In the present economic situation agriculture our basic industry is suffering greater loss than any other. Be it therefore resolved that the members of the Central Farmers' Institute here assembled commend the department of Agriculture in the Maritimes in their endeavor in presenting an agricultural brief at the Imperial Conference and would further respectfully ask that our Federal representatives use every effort to further the interests of Agriculture at the coming conference.

# Windows Shattered In Liverpool Cathedral

LIVERPOOL, England, July 15.—(Friday)—A crowd of Orangemen singing hymns, attacked the cathedral here and shattered four stained-glass windows with stones in rioting last night.

The attack on the cathedral followed one of a series of clashes between Orange and Catholic rivals which blocked traffic on Park Road, one of the main thoroughfares, and neighboring streets. The powers of the police were seriously taxed.

The rioting began Wednesday night and despite urgent appeals by the leaders on both sides was renewed yesterday.

# Girl Swallows Coppers; Taken To Hospital

SPRINGHILL, N. S., July 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—Despite the fact that she recently swallowed two large coppers, Marguerite Anderson, 8-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Justin Anderson is suffering no ill effects except a sore throat. Hospital authorities today said several days might elapse before her condition changed.

The little girl was in a local store when the accident occurred.

She carried several coppers, and two of them slipped into her mouth. As she brushed her hand over them they lodged in her throat, and the storekeeper rushed her toward the hospital in his car. The girl was in agony until the car passed over a bump on the road, after which she announced that the coppers had disappeared. An X-ray examination in the hospital revealed the coppers in her stomach.
