### 2nd. Queen's Liberal Ass'n. Annual Meeting

### Y. M. C. A. Project Is Progressing

Much progress has been made by M.F. Schumann and Company in the construction of the new Charlottetown Y.M.C.A. building which was commenced last June. The cement basement, which is 100 feet long and 100 feet wide and 12 to 15 feet high, has been practically completed and the erection of the main steel frame will be commenced within the next few days.

The project, said yesterday that the work being done at the present time in the completing of the basement, is the removing of the wooden forms, which held the concrete in place, and the grinding and finishing of the outside exposed surfaces of the cement foundation.

Mr. Byron Crockett, job foreman for M.F. Schumann and Company, said over 2,000 bags of cement had been used on the job so far. About 110 carpenters and eight labourers are employed on the job at present.

## C. W. L. Diocesan Convention Closes

Strong condemnation of "the ever-growing consumption of alcoholic beverages" in the Province, coupled with a request for the teaching of scientific temperance in the public schools, was expressed in resolutions passed at the closing session here yesterday of the Diocesan convention of the Catholic Women's League.

Other resolutions condemned salacious motion pictures and literature; expressed disapproval of the Divorce Court proceedings; urged 100 percent pasteurization of all milk sold for human consumption, and requested that Latin be restored to the school curriculum.

Mrs. Henry Trainor was re-elected president for the ensuing year, the installation of officers being conducted by the national president, Mrs. W. J. Dunsin.

Thursday morning the delegates to the C. W. L. Diocesan convention attended Mass in St. Dunstan's Basilica at 9.30. Rev. Francis McQuaid, Diocesan Chaplain was the celebrant. Beautiful hymns were sung by young ladies from St. Joseph's convent choir.

## Narrowly Escaped In Street Accident

Two boys, Allison Bell, 15, and Eric Ferguson, 13, both of Charlottetown narrowly escaped injury yesterday morning about 11.30 when the horse which they were driving ran away.

The incident occurred in front of Thomas H. Mills' Meat Market, 136 Hillsboro St. when one of the traces of his delivery wagon dropped off the "swing" hitting the horse on the leg, just as the two boys were mounting the wagon to make some deliveries. The horse bolted straight up Hillsboro St., narrowly missing parked cars on the way up, and continued on to Upper Hillsboro, where it took to the sidewalk. The wagon hit a lamp post about 50 yards farther on, the two boys jumping from the wagon just before it struck.

The horse, breaking all the harness continued on up the street, leaving the wagon with one wheel caught behind the pole. About 15 minutes later the horse was found in a back yard at 54 School St. The two boys fortunately escaped injury but were badly shaken up. The horse was also uninjured except for a few scratches on its hind legs. Damage to the harness and wagon is estimated at about \$30.

## To Display New Aircraft At Air Show

A plane which will be on display for the first time this side of the Atlantic will be one of the features of the Charlottetown Airport tomorrow afternoon. The plane is a Miles Gemini and is the British bid to capture the personal aircraft market in Canada. It is a twin-engine plane.

The aircraft comes here through an invitation extended by Mr. Paul Sharpe of Paul's Flying School who was in Halifax yesterday picking up parachutes in connection with the performance there. The Miles Gemini took off from England and landed on the Canadian Aircraft Carrier Warrior and when 20 miles off the Canadian shoreline flew into Halifax. It is believed the first time a civilian aircraft was carried on a warship.

It is expected that more than 25 aircraft will take part in the Air Show and preparations for the event will be completed today.

The program will include a fly-past by visiting aircraft; formation flying by three former R.C.A.F. pilots; a balloon bursting contest, in which planes dive at hydrogen-filled balloons and attempt to break them with their propellers; a bombing contest, and the sensational "Mr. X" who climbs out of an aircraft while it is in flight, allows the motor to stop and then, without a parachute, swings the propeller to start the engine again.

Individual performances will be given by Mr. Don Simmonson, Moncton, N.B., and Mr. Alex Baintjente of Springfield, N.S.

The climax of the day's events will be a parachute jump by Mr. Edmund Audet of Baie-St-Jean, N.B. In addition the Maritime Central Airways' 26-passenger Douglas DC-3 will be on display.

The day's program will wind up with a dance at the Sporting Club.

Lorraine Doucette, two of the occupants of the car at the time of the accident.

In his evidence Dr. Campbell told of a victim who had multiple cuts and bruises on the body. The deceased was also suffering from a fracture on the right side of the skull and in his opinion death had been caused by shock, multiple injuries and the fracture of the skull.

Mr. Gordon White, Government engineer showed a plan of where the accident had occurred but objected on the part of defence counsel, Mr. J.O.C. Campbell, on the submission of the plan was upheld by Magistrate Gaudet.

Mr. Harold Shaw, employee of the Royal Bank told of a car having passed the car driven by himself on North River Road on the right of the accident. Later the witness had seen a car of the same model and color on its side in a ditch leading to Beach Grove Inn. At the time the car had passed witness he said it was going considerably faster than the 25 to 30 miles an hour he was driving his own car. He told of coming upon the scene of the accident later and of seeing the body of a girl lying on the pavement about 60 or 70 feet in front of the wrecked machine. He had helped one occupant of the wrecked machine out of the car. Later the latter was showing signs of shock and was very nervous.

Cross examined by Mr. Campbell witness stated that he had seen the car of the same make and color in the ditch near the accident and that there was no question of the car turning over until it had hit a curb.

In answer to question witness stated he thought it would be a fair inference that striking the curb would cause the car to turn over.

Benjamin MacEachern told of taking the Cutcliffe Funeral Home ambulance to the scene of the accident and of taking Miss Doucette to hospital. He said that Miss Doucette was hysterical at the time while Buchanan was very nervous. Miss Biggar was in an unconscious condition.

## Stolen Dutch Gems Returned

FRANKFURT, Aug. 28—(AP)—A heavily-armed convoy of American troops today returned to Holland \$2,500,000 worth of glittering cut diamonds looted by the Nazis from Dutch diamond merchants.

The diamonds, totalling 17,000 carats and including one blazing red diamond valued at \$45,000, were recovered in 1945 by the United States 9th Army from their Nazi hiding place in a German salt mine.

The diamonds were to be turned over to the Dutch Minister of Economics at the Dutch-German border town of Beck, near the Nijmegen battleground.

Packed in 15 wooden boxes, some of the diamonds were as large as seven carats.

"We are restituting the precious stones in time for Queen Wilhelmina of Holland's birthday on Sunday," said Col. William G. Sway, chief of the United States Military Government's Foreign Exchange Depository.

"Return of these stones," said Capt. R. Smit Klein of the Dutch Restitution Mission in American-occupied Germany, "will bring about the revival of the Dutch diamond-cutting trade in time."

Brey said that the United States Military Government holds another 100,000 carats of diamonds, mostly industrial, in the vaults of the depository in Frankfurt, Reichsbank. The Dutch Government, he said, had put in a second claim for 6,000 carats.

Brey said that the diamonds being restored were looted in 1942 when the Nazis ordered all Dutch diamond merchants to turn in their stocks. The seized stones were kept under German control in a bank at Arnhem, Holland, while the Nazis tried various forms of pressure to force the owners to "sell" at "ridiculously low prices."
