MONTREAL, Nov. 19—Cattle receipts 1898. There was a comparatively small percentage of steers in the offering and no tops. The bulk of the cattle were canners and cutters and prices on these were steady at \$3.50 to \$4.50, with bologna bulls also steady at \$5.25 to \$5.75, with heavy bulls up to \$6.00, butcher cattle were estimated to be from 25 cents to 50 cents higher. Steers of medium good average quality sold for \$9.00 to \$9.75. A few kinds of steers weighing around 1,000 pounds sold for \$8.25 to \$8.50 and common steers from \$7.00 to \$8.00. Cows were strong at \$5.00 to \$6.00 with the bulk of the plain cows between \$5.00 and \$6.50.

Quotations—Butcher steers good \$9.00 to \$9.75, medium \$8.50 to \$9.00, common \$7.00 to \$8.25. Butcher heifers good \$8.25 to \$9.75, medium \$7.25 to \$8.25, common \$5.00 to \$7.00. Butcher cows, good \$7.25 to \$8.00, butcher bulls common \$5.25 to \$6.00.

Calf receipts 1326—Calves were stronger, the bulk of the grassers sold for \$6.00 to \$6.50 and veals up to \$13.00. There were no choice veals.

Quotations—Good veal \$12.50 to \$14.00, medium \$11.00 to \$12.50, common \$9.00 to \$11.00, grassers \$6.00 to \$9.50.

Sheep receipts 4,775—Lambs were about even with last Monday. Good lots sold mostly for \$10.50 with a \$2.00 cut on bucks. Gulls sold around \$9.40. Sheep were about steady.

Quotations—Ewes \$3.00 to \$6.00, lambs good \$10.50, common \$9.00 to \$10.25.

Hog receipts 2,185—Hogs were stronger. Packers offered \$10.00 for carcasses of good weights ungraded and sales were made up to \$10.25. Sows were quoted at \$7.50.
