Henry Wise Wood Dies In New York

NEW YORK, April 9—Henry A. Wise Wood, chairman of the Board and former president of the Wood Newspaper Machinery Corporation, who was famous as the inventor of modern high-speed newspaper presses, died tonight after an illness of five days. He was 73.

Wood invented and manufactured much of the intricate modern machinery that makes possible the large circulation of daily newspapers today.

Among them were the autoplater, producing plates previously made by hand; the autoreel, which feeds newspaper to high-speed presses, and the autopaster, which replaces one blank roll of paper with another without stoppage of the press. His inventions, largely, raised the rate of newspaper production from 24,000 to 60,000 copies an hour. The autoplater, which prints one second—(Mr. Wise Wood visited Charlottetown some years ago and is remembered by friends here.)

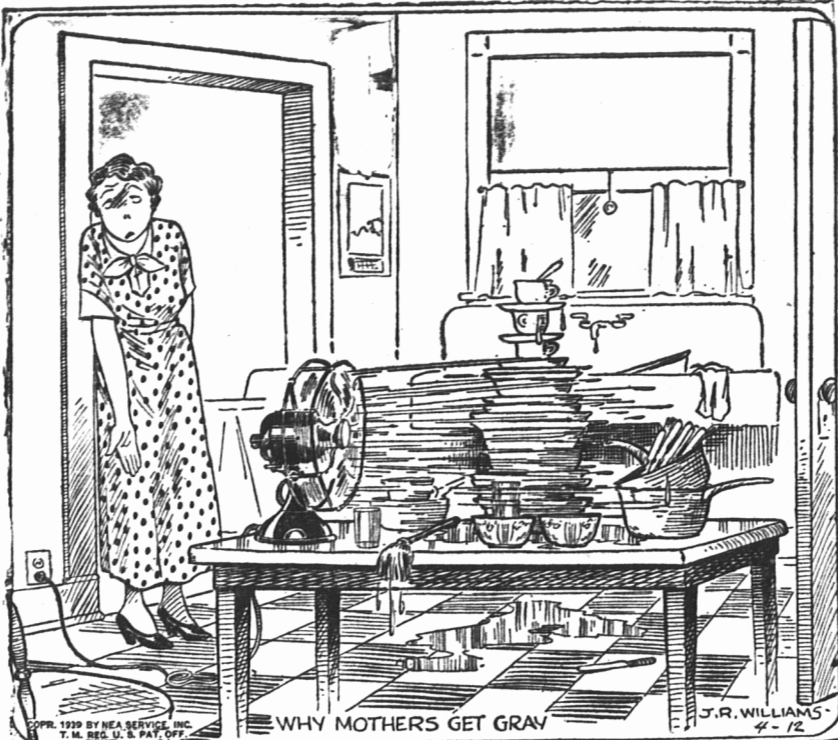

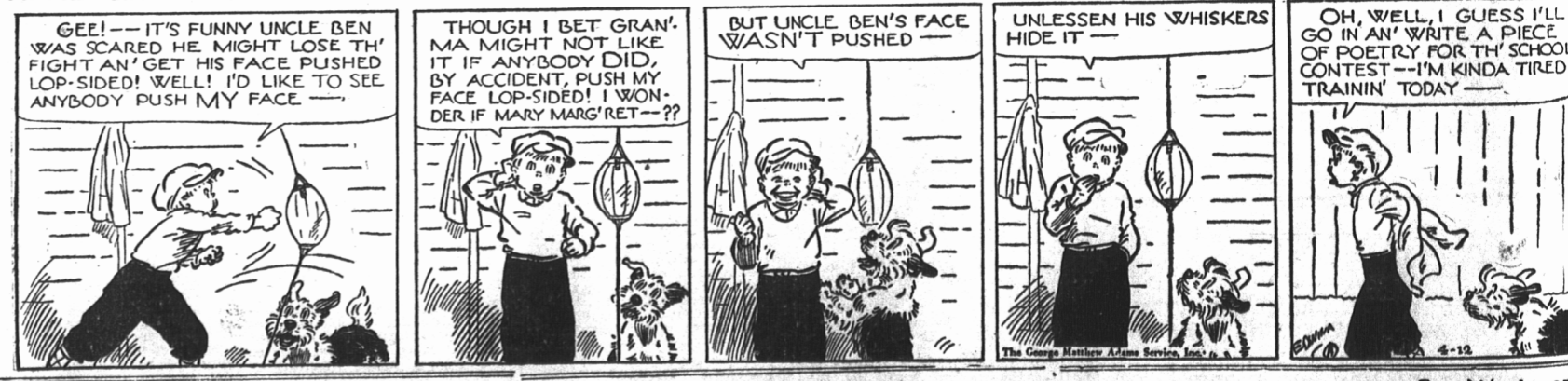
