ALLS FOR AID DISCUSSED IN FEDERAL HOUSE

OTTAWA, Ont., March 21.—(Canadian Press)—Closely co-operation between the Dominion and Quebec Province in fishery matters was advocated in the House of Commons today by Pierre Casgrain, chief Liberal whip. He moved the following resolution: "That, in the opinion of this House, it is desirable that the Dominion Government should co-operate to a greater extent with the Provincial Government in order to assist the Maritime fisheries in the Province of Quebec."

Grand Duchess Marie of Russia (3), the bridegroom's mother, travelled from New York for the ceremony, but refused to attend when the prince insisted on a civil marriage. League of Nations Commission Of Enquiry Visit Battlefront — Find Disputants Ready For Formal Peace Conference.

SHANGHAI, Mar. 21. — (AP)—Chinese and Japanese negotiators reached a basis for peace today, after long parleys here, while League of Nations investigators viewed the scars of recent conflict between the two forces. Members of the League's Commission of enquiry returned, grimy and weary, from an all-day tour of the battlefields. They found the rival disputants ready for a formal peace conference, scheduled to begin Wednesday.

Quo Tai-Chi, representing China, said the terms on which the two sides apparently agreed provided: 1. The Chinese troops would remain where they now are, about 20 miles west of Shanghai. (Continued on Page 8)

CALGARY, Alta., March 21.—(By the Canadian Press)—Held in connection with the shooting of a street car conductor during an attempted robbery here Saturday night, three youths were remanded until March 23, when they appeared in court today on vagrancy charges. The young men are John Turkitch, 19, Steve Turkitch 18, brothers; and Don Simpson 20. They are being held without bail pending further investigation by police.

Samuel Emery, the conductor, was shot and seriously wounded when the two gunmen held up his car late Saturday. The gunmen fled without obtaining any money. (Continued on Page 8)

"Bloody Sunday" In The Ukraine

Soviet Soldiers Show No Quarter To "Rebellious" Peasants Who Try To Defend Their Churches Against Wreckers.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, March 21.—(A.P.)—Reports of Soviet soldiers shooting down rebellious peasants in the Ukraine, among them women defending their churches against wreckers, came today from Rumanian villages on the Ukrainian frontier. An uprising in the Ukraine was reported. The dispatches said martial law had been established over a two-kilometre zone on the Russian side of the Dniester River to prevent a further escape of peasants into Rumania. Soviet Church-wrecking activities in the Ukrainian village of Tasselak resulted in a "bloody Sunday," said alleged eye-witness accounts from Kitzani, Rumania, across the river. Soviet soldiers, attempting to destroy a church in Russia's anti-religious campaign, were faced by 300 women, the reports said, the soldiers killing and wounding several with machine gun fire. ANGLO-IRISH CONFERENCE IS LIKELY

De Valera's Intention Of Abolishing The Oath To The Crown And With-holding Land Annuities From England May Necessitate Step.

DUBLIN, IRISH FREE STATE, March 21. — (AP) — President Edmond De Valera's intention of abolishing the oath to the Crown and withholding Irish land annuities from Great Britain may result in an Anglo-Irish conference, it was learned today.

The President declined to say anything about the issues today and the British Government is expected to take the initiative in the calling of any conference. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, said in a speech at Birmingham, England, last week that the British Government would have the "gravest concern" in any such suggestions as Mr. De Valera made. LONDON, Mar. 21.—The National Government's wheat quota bill to provide a guaranteed price to British wheat growers tonight passed through the committee stage in the House of Commons and will come up for third reading after Easter.

Will Be Deported

HALIFAX, N. S., March 21.—Mrs. Chor, who was held in detention quarters here when the Alauina docked on Saturday, after preventive officers and Royal Canadian Mounted Police had searched her cabin and confiscated papers, will be deported to France on Monday, Chief Immigration Inspector H. M. Grant said tonight. She will re-cross the Atlantic on the Alauina when the liner calls here from New York on the return trip. Beyond "passport irregularities" officials would not disclose any specific reason for Mrs. Chor's detention and deportation.
