John Jury and Barbara MacDuff were married in Charlottetown, and of their family Mrs. Dunlap was the last survivor. Mrs. Dunlap was twice married, by her first husband one son, John Cameron, of Charlottetown, survived. After the death of her first husband, Mrs. Cameron married the late Jas. Dunlap, of Moncton, who was one of the leading residents and died January, 1879. By her second marriage there were four children, of whom there survive, James H. Dunlap and Miss Victoria A. Dunlap of Moncton.
