My leg is starting to heal a little but not much yet. I had it X-rayed today and thank goodness there is no more old iron in here. This is a very nice place and the nurses are very good to me. It is the greatest place for cats I ever saw. Five meals a day and good ones at that. I have won my two stripes on the field and the Military Medal. So you see I have done something. Love to all.
