Thomas McNutt, Leslie D. McNutt, Malpeque; Howard R. Hillson, W. H. Aitken, A. W. Sterns and W. E. Bentley, Charlottetown; John O. Johnson, Montreal and William Calbeck, Bedeque. The Provisional Directors are Messrs. Thomas McNutt, W. H. Aitken and A. W. Sterns; the solicitor is Mr. W. E. Bentley. This company was organized last spring and has already planted a thousand barrels of oysters on its grounds in Richmond Bay. It has also purchased a modern, fully equipped oyster boat which is now on its way here from Bridgeport, Conn., which was reported in Halifax a few days ago and is expected here shortly.
