TONIGHT'S MEETING.—At the Quarterly Meeting of the Board of Trade this evening the joint committee of the Board and the City Council will report progress on the question of the government paying a portion of the Income Tax to the City. Reports will also be received from the Railway Time Table and Transportation Committees.
