The War This Week (By Don Gilbert, Canadian Press) After a full week of hostilities, the people of Berlin had their first large-scale air raids in the 52nd week of the war. Early night but the bombers of the Royal Air Force visited the German capital, destroying war industries and communication facilities. Aircraft factories in northern Italy were another important target for the British night raiders and while the Nazi authorities kept up the pretence that no vital damage was caused, the Italians were frank enough to admit hits on the Fiat factory at Milan and elsewhere. The intensity of the German raids on Britain was not maintained on the scale of the previous week. The attacking formations were smaller, and on no day did the number of Nazi machines sent down reach a 100 mark that was twice exceeded previously. The Germans, however, concentrated on the more important centres. Attempts were made to reach London several times each day, and such industrial centres as Liverpool, Manchester and Birmingham were visited in the course of the week. The British authorities exceeded damage to industrial establishments, but naturally they did not help the enemy by disclosing the extent. While the air went on, and the long threatened attacks by thousands of Nazi planes at a time and the predicted invasion seemed no nearer, the Nazi regime sought to consolidate its position in southeastern Europe by forcing Rumania to cede half of her province of Transylvania to Hungary. The German action in summing up a meeting on the matter at Vienna had the earmarks of urgency and it was widely reported

REGISTRATION OF ALIENS. The Defence of Canada Regulations now requires all persons who have been naturalized British subjects since the first day of September, 1932, and who at the time of their naturalization were of German or Italian nationality, or of the nationality of any territory which was under German or Italian control at the outbreak of war to report for registration without delay to the nearest Registrar of Enemy Aliens. Notices to this effect, giving the location of the local Registrar, will be posted throughout all districts within the next few days. It is emphasized that this registration is in addition to, and entirely separate from, National Registration.
