Four hundred and thirty-seven students favored a revision in teaching methods, but failed to take advantage of an opportunity offered to suggest remedies.

THE MARKETS (Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 20.—On the produce and dairy market here today prices of potatoes advanced and butter declined. White eggs and cheese were unchanged. New Brunswick green mountain potatoes gained five cents, carlot prices being quoted at 75 cents per 90 pounds bulk and to retailers 85 cents per 80 pound bag. A year ago prices were quoted at \$1.60 for carlots and \$1.70 to retailers. Eastern townships number one pasteurized butter lost one quarter of a cent at 32 cents and western was unchanged at 32 cents a pound. To retailers solids were 34 cents and prints 35 cents a pound. Receipts were 923 boxes. Carlot prices of fresh British Columbia and Ontario eggs were 32 cents for extras, 28 to 29 cents for firsts and 21 to 22 cents a dozen for seconds. JACKET FROCKS. Jacket frocks promise to play an even greater role in spring fashions than they did last year. But this season there is a difference, for in almost every case the jacket is short, scarcely more than a bolero in fact. Printed silk evening frocks with brief jackets banded with fur on the sleeves are "a high fashion" at 31 cents, firsts at 27 cents and seconds at 20 cents a dozen. Storage firsts were 18 to 19 cents and seconds 16 to 17 cents a dozen. Quotations to retailers were unchanged. Receipts were 875 cases. Winter white cheese was quoted at 12 cents and colored at 4 3-4 to 15 cents and summer cheese at 15 1-2 to 16 cents a pound receipts were 145 boxes.
