The addition to Stanley Cheese Factory is about completed and the boiler will be moved into it to make room for more vats and presses in the main building.

VERY little work done in farming in the section surrounding Bay View yet. Some few have started the plow, but the soil is too wet and sticky to work right. It will be some days before there is any sowing done.

G. W. BELL of Stanley held an auction sale of milk cows a few days ago. They were a lot that he purchased from farmers up West. We understand that the transaction did not turn out profitably. Several of the cattle were withdrawn from sale on account small prices offered.

The Ottawa Citizen says a king among Fraternal Insurance men is unquestionably Dr. Oronhyatekha, of Toronto, Supreme Chief Ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters. The history of the doctor in connection with the I.O.F. is remarkable. Back in the later seventies, when Dr. Oronhyatekha was practicing in London with no prospect of becoming wealthy before the close of the century, an incident in his life turned the course of events in such a way that at the close of the century he has become both popular and famous.

At that time the editor of this paper was a member of Court Hope, No. 1, I. O. F., in London, and was commissioned as a Deputy to organize another court in London. Court Dufferin No. 7, was thus formed, and by request of the organizer, Dr. Oronhyatekha became one of its charter members. A few months later, after seventeen courts had been organized in Ontario, a High Court for the Province was instituted at Brantford. Dr. Oronhyatekha was nominated for High Chief Ranger, but declined; and the editor of this paper was elected by acclamation as the first R. W. H. C. R. in Canada. He was succeeded at the second annual meeting by Dr. Oronhyatekha, who has since continued to be the highest official in the order in Canada, and whose influence and indomitable pluck and perseverance have given the Order a leading place among fraternal insurance bodies throughout the world, and himself a position more prominent than that of any other promoter of fraternal insurance.

Mr. Kenneth Walker of this city has shown THE GUARDIAN a number of articles that were picked up on South African battlefields by his brother, Private James Walker, and sent home. The articles came enclosed in one of the chocolate boxes sent by Her Majesty the Queen to the soldiers as a New Years present. On the top of the cover an image of the Queen is embossed with the crown and letters V. I. R. at the left, and on the right the words, South Africa, 1900. Beneath in a fac simile of Her Majesty's handwriting is the message, "I wish you a happy New Year.—Victoria R. I." The contents of the box which, as above stated, were picked up on the battlefields, are various articles pertaining to military uniforms and equipment, British and Boer. Here are numbers and names of regiments, as "33," "R. H." "Cornwall," "Gordon," bugles' crowns and miniature shields in bronze or silver, coins are also on the card on which the trophies are neatly displayed. The collection may be seen in Messrs Haszard & Moore's window to-day.

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

At Charlottetown and within Zion Church there on Tuesday, May 8th, and at 11 o'clock a. m., which time and place the Presbytery of P. E. Island met and was constituted, Rev. D. B. McLeod, Moderator, with whom were present Messrs. Sinclair, John Gillis, Archd. Gunn, Stewart, E. Gillis, Campbell, McLeod, Spencer, R. McLean, Fisher, Millar, Craise, Smith, Robertson, McNeill, McIntosh, Layton, D. McLean, Murdoch, Ministers and Messrs. McKinley, Mutch, Angus McDonald, Wm. Brown, Beaton, J. J. McLeod ruling elders.

Minutes of meetings held on Feb. 6th, March 6th and March 22nd were read and sustained.

After reading communications the Presbytery took up the petition of certain residents of Rose Valley and Bradalbane. Read reply from the session of Strathalbyn, also a resolution of a congregational meeting and a resolution of the Board of Managers, all strongly disapproving of the prayer of the petition. Commissioners from the congregation, Messrs. Duncan McDonald and Donald McKenzie, were heard in support of the congregational resolution. After questions had been asked, the parties were removed from the Bar. The Presbytery then discussed the matter and on motion a committee consisting of Messrs. Sinclair, Layton, Millar, Stewart, Spencer, ministers, and Mr. Match, elder, were appointed to bring in a resolution at the afternoon sederunt.
