 What shall it profit a country as great as our Dominion to wipe off the slate Millions of dollars of debt every year By ribald beverage rooms reeking with beer?

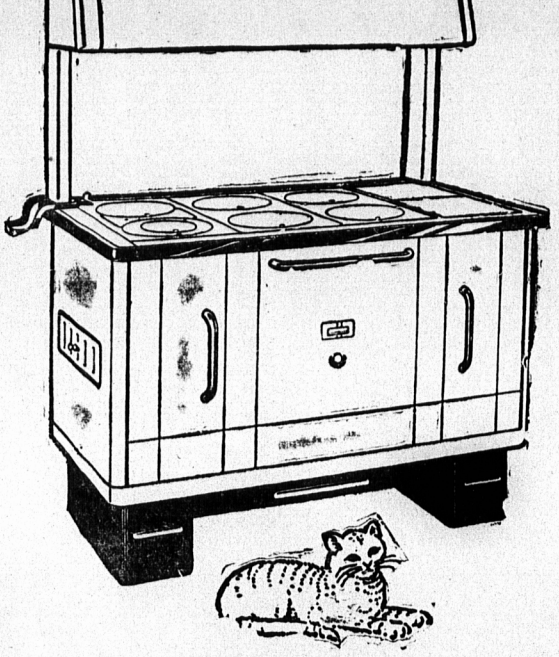

It is deeper and higher than all the changes of human experience. It is not destroyed by the shocks and invasions of earthly things. It is something the world cannot give nor take away. It is Christ's own peace of heart and mind bestowed upon all those who trust their souls to Him. "We bless Thee for Thy peace, O God."
