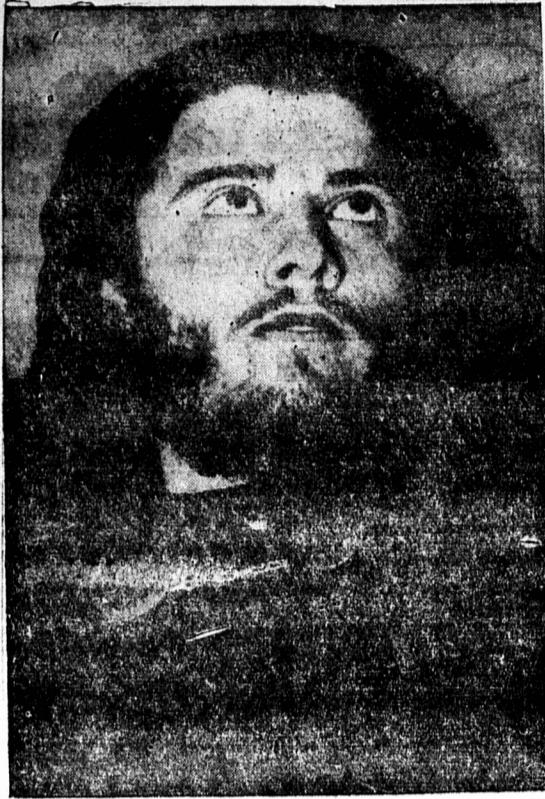

The play which features a female impersonation, is very funny, and at times the gales of laughter were so prolonged that the players had difficulty going on with their lines.

The part of the bona fide Aunt Tillie who went to town both literally and figuratively, was capably taken care of by Mrs. E. J. Barrass. The transformation in her appearance during the final act was in itself a work of art. Mr. Roy Daye was particularly good in the role of the nonchalant Ronald Howland who kept getting in and out of trouble all evening, and whose "double" talk was particularly amusing.

Mrs. Everett Brooks, as the man-crazy maid, kept the audience in stitches every time she appeared before the footlights. Her ogling of the indifferent Mr. Howland was a highlight of the play. Mr. Everett Brooks took the part of the pseudo-Aunt Tillie and his costumes, at one time reduced to the extremity of a barrel, threw the audience into fits of uncontrollable merriment.

Mr. Ted Poole's impersonation of Charlie One Lung, a Chinese cook, would be difficult to surpass among amateur Thespians, and Mrs. Poole was also quite good in the role of a chiropractor whose "treatment" of the unfortunate Mervin Tucker in his guise of Aunt Tillie was a riot of comedy. Miss Betty Macee was charming in the role of Pamela Marsh, Aunt Tillie's niece, and Miss Edythe Simmons gave a competent interpretation of Lizzie Parsons, an aspiring young novelist apparently always on the verge of hysterics.

Miss Anna Harris as Ellen Neeland, Mr. Ernest Morrison as Luther Lorrimer, and Mrs. Morrison as Mrs. Tillie Tucker, though having shorter roles, did well on their brief appearances and contributed substantially to the success of the play. The players showed the results of careful direction, very few cues were missed, and the gesturing, quite often the bane of amateur productions, was adequate. Rev. E. J. Barrass acted as chairman.
