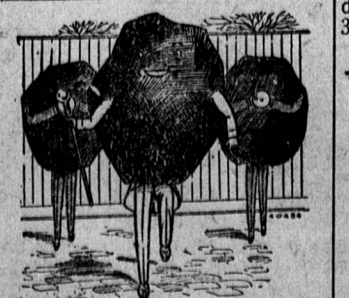

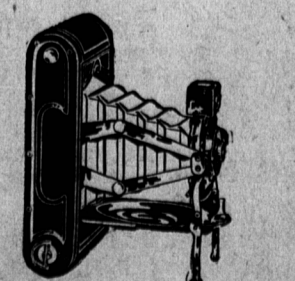
AT BEAUTIFUL St Peter's Bay
