IS IT WORTH WHILE TO BE A MILLIONAIRE?

The life, death and burial of Russell Sage naturally raises the question. He was one of the more fortunate in several respects of the possessors of great wealth. He lived simply, and being possessed of a good constitution enjoyed good health in the main down to extreme old age. Few laborers in any walk of life worked harder than he, and none had fewer holidays; but he found enjoyment, such as it was in his work. Many have grown rich and ceased from their labors in order to take enjoyment from their wealth, only to be forced to confess that they were happier while in the arduous struggle of making a fortune than after it was won. Russell Sage found his enjoyment in making money till the last.

Once he was assailed by a madman who attempted to extort money by threatening to blow him up with dynamite. The madman actually exploded the fearful charge in Sage's presence, wrecked the office, killed several persons and the millionaire's escape was almost miraculous. This peril was wholly due to his reputed wealth, and even afterward he feared, as all the very rich fear some similar attack. This is a danger to which the poor or those in moderate circumstance are not exposed. And after all, beyond such joy as money making gives, Sage had few pleasures that are not within the reach of the masses. He cared nothing for dress or show, and could enjoy but three meals a day, as almost every one can.

But death as well as life has added dangers for the very rich. There is the danger that ghouls may steal his dead body and hold it for ransom, as happened in the case of A. T. Stewart, the merchant Prince of New York. Because of this when Russell Sage was buried the grave was lined with a burglar-proof steel case weighing three tons, in which the coffin was enclosed and locked, and so connected with electric wires that any attempt to trespass thereon would ring an alarm. These elaborate preparations for greater security were made at a cost of \$25,000. Such are some of the perils during life and after death to which great wealth exposes its owner, and from which the mass of men are exempt. And so far as any practical use or benefit to himself the hoarded millions above what goes to make a competence were of as little value to Russell Sage as so many pebbles on the seashore.

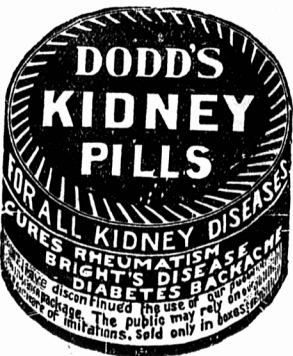
Here was a man who devoted his energies with great success to laying up treasure upon earth. He was greedy of gain and during life, and in the final disposal of his money when his hands could

hold it no longer, he gave no thought to his fellow men. At its best it was a barren sort of life he lived, if judged by purely human standards. Money-getting thus pursued through long years, to the exclusion of all other interests, pursuits and pleasures, inevitably chills and dwarfs the heart and moral stature of a man. Russell Sage was a giant in finance, but a pigmy in the moral world, unconscious perhaps of his own insignificance in that regard but still a pigmy. Compare such a life as his with that of General Booth, who has devoted his fine talents and long years to the uplifting of his fellow men. Booth has no worldly possessions, but the world recognizes him as a man of noble stature. He has even now a wider and a better fame than the dead millionaire, and probably has had more real enjoyment even in this life. And what of the great beyond?

THE KING'S HORSES.

If King Edward cannot now visit Canada some of His Majesty's horses are coming, and will appear at the London and Ottawa Exhibitions this fall as a splendid attraction. A special effort should be made to have these fine animals—Shires—brought to the Maritime Province fairs, including our own Inter provincial show. It would seem that this might be effected conveniently and have the horses embark at Halifax for home afterward. The Guardian learns that Hon. Sidney Fisher, at whose instance the King's horses are being brought to this country, can give any needed information on the subject. The Exhibition authorities would do well to correspond with him.

Hon. Edward Blake is again in Canada for a vacation, two months of which he will spend at Murray Bay and then proceed to Toronto where he expects to remain till January. His birthday will occur in the meantime, October 13, when he will be seventy three years of age.

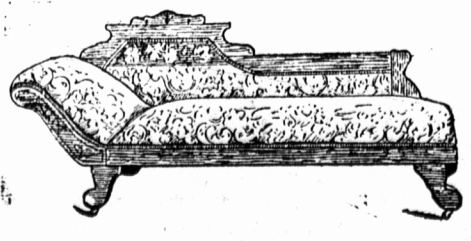
