THE Stanley's freight to Pictou yesterday morning was as follows: 20 dressed hogs; 5 pkgs meats; 630 bushels oats, 750 bush. potatoes— 8 pkgs butter and eggs; a quantity of household furniture and sundries.

THE outward cargo of the Minty yesterday morning consisted of 3000 bus oats 21 rolls leather, 38 dressed hogs, 52 cases eggs, 85 pkgs mutton, 14 bbls pork, 5 pkgs household effects and a quantity of cheese, canned goods, etc.

ON Saturday Mr. Geo. C. Younker Milton, complained of an extreme pain in his leg. On Sunday a doctor was summoned and yesterday upon his physician's advice he was removed to the P. E. Island Hospital for treatment. It is thought that he is suffering from blood poisoning.

RESIDENTS of the South side of the river were complaining bitterly yesterday of the mode of crossing. It appears that the steamers were not used and a boat was the mode of conveyance. It is hoped that to-day everything will work more smoothly and that there will be no cause for complaint.

At the police court yesterday John Scott for being drunk, was fined \$3 or 15 days. The case of Ellen McNeill was further adjourned. Miss Callaghan appeared and stated that her sister was now en route from Sydney. The lad William McCarthy accused of larceny from the office of M. P. Hogan, was released on his own recognizance.

P. E. I. COMMERCIAL COLLEGE.—It gives us much pleasure to announce that another student of this popular institution, —Mr. William G. Bruce, of Red Point, Souris, has completed a full business course and received the College diploma. Mr. Bruce was highly popular as a student and was indefatigable in pushing his way up to his present position, and he now goes forth into the business world thoroughly qualified for the duties pertaining to his profession. Mr. William Acorn, for the past two years manager of the Park Corner Cheese and Butter Factory has resigned his position, and to-morrow morning leaves for Sydney, C. B. where he will enter into partnership with his brother, Mr. J. H. C. Acorn, who conducts a wholesale produce and grocery business in that City. Mr. Acorn has been one of P. E. Island's most progressive cheese and butter makers and the product of the cheese and butter factory secured first prize at the Provincial Exhibition. Last year, some 2,000,000 lbs of milk was supplied to both factories, 95 of the patrons supplying the cheese factory and 150 the butter room. Mr. Acorn attended the Sussex Dairy School last winter and considers time spent with in its wall of great benefit to the student. In the school there are four rooms each under an instructor and the lectures given in addition must prove of benefit even to the most sceptical.

We are pleased to see that our old friend the Dramatist of St. Dunstan's has arisen from the comatose state in which circumstances had kept him of late and has again donned the buskin. It is indeed surprising that the students lacking as they did past experience should manifest such skill in the histrionic act as Friday night's performance evinced. It was their first attempt and they may well feel proud of it. If two years of inactivity were necessary to accomplish what they have done, even then the recent exquisite and masterly rendition would amply repay the long waiting. It would also, perhaps, account for the high grade of proficiency which the members of the society evidently occupy. But we strongly suspect what the real explanation of this very creditable issue is to be found in the ability which this society now possesses. This would appear from the recasting of the drama, which, far from losing anything by the revision to which they subjected it, has been enhanced two-fold. To certain little details they have given "a local habitation and a name," that bespeaks the hand of an artist rather than the efforts of amateurs. They also detected and have placed in evidence, some delicate touches of dramatic art which had hitherto allowed to pass unnoticed. The society is to be congratulated on the success it achieved at its first presentation. This will tend to invite the activity of the members and draw their attention to histrionics, which are certainly a good means of intellectual development.
