WAITING FOR PEACE

America's Cup Challenge Waiting on the War.

SIR THOMAS LIPTON

Sybarita is Believed by Designer Watson to be an Eye-Opener.

A correspondent of the Boston Globe says:—Most of the war rumors which have kept the people of this country on the tip-toe of expectation during the past week have pointed toward a speedy end of the conflict, but no one whose opinion carries any weight has yet been got to put a date on the probable end of the trouble. For these reasons there has been no further move toward the fixing of an international yachting contest, and as I have already explained, Sir Thomas Lipton has decided to leave the arrangements for his next challenge as they stand until such time as sporting matters may more reasonably occupy the public attention.

The chief anxiety of owner, designer and skipper is to see how the new Watson boat Sybarita will perform. With this in view, it has been arranged that Capt. Sycamore shall accompany Capt. Bevis to Germany on the Sybarita and see her matches against the Emperor's Meteor.

Capt. Sycamore was practically the only one not directly employed on the boat who was present on the launch. In the course of a conversation which I had with him, he admitted that he was unable, after studying the boat from every possible standpoint, to satisfy himself in his estimate of what he experienced from her. From the mid-ship section aft he had nothing but praise for the fairness and beauty of her lines, but the forebody, with its broad, short shoulders at the deck-line, and its shallow grip forward a fin, rather puzzled him. Of all the boats Mr. Watson had designed he said the Sybarita seemed to him to bear most resemblance to the Valkyrie III., though there were still many points of difference. His belief was that she has been designed for a hit or miss chance, and that she would prove either a wonderful fast boat or perfect failure. He saw no reason to expect failure and he fully believed that she would be an eye opener.

Her spars are worthy of attention, for, following out the idea of saving the last ounce of weight, everything in which hollowing is possible has been hollowed. There has been no experimenting with the mainmast. It is a fine solid stick of Oregon pine, shaped in what is now the usual manner by having its greatest thickness at the hound and tapering off to masthead and deck. When weighed complete with its ironwork, but without any gear, it just turned the scale at 3 tons, 15 cwt. The topmast, also solid, is a fine piece of Scotch fir, about 55 feet long, and the bowsprit is a somewhat similar spar which will project no less than 30 feet beyond the stemhead. The main boom is a built steel spar, plated with quarter-inch metal on T-shaped ribs and strengthened by steel spurs set cross and across all through the length of it. The mizzen will be a considerable stretch of canvas, with a hoist of nearly 50 feet and a boom projecting

close upon 31 feet beyond the taffrail. It is apparent, therefore that, canvassed in the fashion and measuring within a fraction of 50 feet on the water-line, the new yacht is, in point of rating, quite equal to a meeting with anything that ever raced for the America's cup. Whether she is also equal in point of speed is a question which many people on this side are anxiously waiting to have answered.

As Capt. Sycamore's duties in connection with the new Challenger still lie far ahead, Sir Thomas Lipton has asked him to consult with Mr. Fife, Jr., and arrange the details connected with the alterations which will be carried out on the Fairlie challenger.

A meeting of those interested in the international yacht race which is proposed to hold on the Clyde next year in connection with the Glasgow exhibition has been called for to decide upon the form that the contest shall take. The amount available for prize money promises to be £1000.

The Lyceum Company.

The Lyceum Company were greeted with well filled seats in their presentation of Hamlet at the Grand Opera House last evening. It is an ambitious undertaking to attempt Shakespeare's masterpiece here where necessarily many of the appointments of the great Metropolitan theatres are wanting and where the great tragedy has been seldom put on the boards. A portion of our regular theatre goers have seen Hamlet as played by Edwin Booth and have been close students of the play. These would naturally follow the performance of last evening or any other with critical eyes and ears, quick to note an abridgement of a scene or any violation of the canons of the stage as laid down by Hamlet himself. These would also find much to commend in the Hamlet of Mr. Edouard D'Oize, while perhaps recalling that in the very torrent, tempest and the "whirlwind of passion" the actor ought "to acquire and beget a temperance that may give it smoothness." The fault of too much vocal emphasis is all too common. But withal it was a strong forceful and clear conception of Hamlet that Mr. D'Oize gave us. Perhaps more than before we might incline to the certainty that the Royal Dane had really become insane after seeing the ghost. The Ophelia of Miss Hext was a rare work of histrionic art, smooth and almost perfect in every detail. The Laertes of Mr. Buffham, and the Polonius of Mr. Booke were well conceived. Altogether the performance was an agreeable one, which called forth repeated and hearty applause, and will secure for the Lyceum Company a hearty welcome whenever hereafter they may return to Charlottetown.
