LONDON, Oct. 31, (Special)—No one appears to attach any importance to the suggestion that Duke of Connaught should be made hereditary Governor-General of Canada. In fact, no one here seems to have heard of the suggestion, said to have originally emanated from Canada until it was cabled back here from a Canadian paper.
Among Canadian visitors when the idea is referred to of founding a Canadian dynasty and giving Canada a king it provokes a smile. "We Canadians are very fond of the Duke of Connaught," said one Canadian last night, "but we don't want any hereditary authorities set up to govern us, even in the pleasing way of the Governor-General we have already had."
Lord Strathcona declines to discuss such a statement "based upon the vaguest of rumors and backed by no authority, but with regard to the possible succession of Prince Arthur" comments the High Commissioner, "if ever it was proposed and accepted Canada would without doubt be ready to give the Prince and his bride as loyal aid and hearty a welcome as they have already given his father and mother."
