### FRIDAY'S GAME

Truro Bearcats, 1930 Maritime Amateur hockey champions will strut their stuff here tomorrow night in an exhibition fixture with the Abegweits. This aggregation are known throughout the Maritime hockey world and Eastern Canada as a career-fast-skating and hard-bumping aggregation that made Upper Canadians sit up and take notice in the Allan Cup playdowns last Spring. Undaunted and not in the least bit perturbed, the Abegweits, although conscious of the steel of their opponents are working hard in preparation for this important game and at the same time confident of giving the highly touted "Cats" one grand run for their money.

With regard to the visit of the Truro team to this city, it may be mentioned in passing that the Club has on its roster, one Pete Mill, defence star, who by the way is the Dominion Canoe Champion. The following may be of interest:—Pete Mill, the Truro Bearcats defence player, was born in Inverness Scotland, and when only a young lad came to Canada. The Truro News says he started hockey at Lachine, P.Q., and played left wing for three years for Lachine Academy. The next five years he played with Quebec Commercial League teams in Montreal and Quebec. In 1928 he went north to South Porcupine, Ontario, where he first started playing on the defence. He has played Canadian Rugby with the M.A.A.A., has been a winner of the Dominion Canoe Championship and has also been in the Semi-finals of the Dominion boxing championships. In 1928 he performed one of the most difficult canoeing feats known in Canada when in company with an American named Reuben Cohn, he shot the Lachine Rapids, the water drops 60 feet in a mile and a half, and flows at the rate of 25 to 30 miles an hour. The same year he travelled from Montreal to Atlantic City by canoe.

## To Establish Fishing Industry On Sound Basis

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 17.—Extensive advertising of the food value of sea fish is the main recommendation of the R.W.E. Burnaby, Maritime Trade Commissioner to Ontario in replying to the appeal from the United Maritime Fishermen through their secretary, Dr. Richard Hamer, for assistance in marketing their catch.

In view of the national importance of establishing the fishing industry on a sound and profitable basis, the Commissioner recommends the Dominion Government consider co-operation with fish selling organizations in an advertising campaign. Adoption of a slogan such as "eat more fish" or "fish the health food" would make an effective appeal to those who prepare the family menu, Mr. Burnaby says.

An appeal to hotels, restaurants and eating houses to specialize in fish dinners or a fish plate is another suggestion. An extensive campaign throughout the press at this time would stimulate the market, and materially increase the consumption. Public interest in the welfare of fishermen and their families, the hazards of their calling, the hardships privations and handicaps under which they labor might well be aroused. Mr. Burnaby emphasizes that in any advertising campaign attention should be drawn to the improvement in shipping facilities and insurance given of the quality of the fish.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Dec. 17.—The British oil screw boat Maskinonge registered at St. George, Newfoundland, was captured by a coast guard patrol boat at 11 o'clock last night with a cargo of liquor off Sakonnet Point, across the Sakonnet river from Newport, coast guard officials reported.

The officials said today that the vessel, which is new and about 90 feet long, was captured within the three mile limit and made no attempt to escape. They said they had not been informed as yet of the size of the seized boat's liquor cargo or of the number of her crew. The vessel will probably be brought to Providence this afternoon.

## Three Killed In Derailment

(Special to the Guardian)

WINNIPEG, Dec. 17.—Three men were killed yesterday when a Canadian Pacific Railway passenger train was derailed near Killaly, Sask. The men, all members of the crew, were trapped in the wreckage when the four car train turned over in the ditch. The cause of the derailment has not been determined.

No passengers were seriously injured according to the official statement from the railway, though five suffered minor bruises. Names of the persons who received bruises were not available. The derailment occurred on a curve one mile west of Killaly, which is 118 miles west of Brandon, Man, on a Brandon Regina branch north of the main line.
