MOULDY BUTTER.

Mould may cause deterioration in butter either by developing on the wrapper and spoiling the appearance of a sample, or by growing in the butter itself and producing thereby such changes in the composition as to make the butter unsaleable. Imperfectly washed butter, containing a high percentage of caseln, provides the most favourable medium of growth and a high water content also encourages the development of mould as does storage in very damp cellars; but practically all risks of damage from this cause are eliminated by the presence of 25 to 30 per cent of salt in the butter, which corresponds to the use of 12 to 15 per cent. brine.

THE WAITING RAT

A wounded soldier who took part in the great advance on the British front on September 25 described the following experience to a London Daily Express representative:

"It is a curious thing that one of my most vivid recollections of the hours preceding the great attack is concerned with so apparently unimportant a thing as a rat.

"I was on listening patrol, which, as you know, means dropping as near to the German lines under cover of the night as you can, and listening for every sign or movement on the part of the enemy. I had reached my post when I discovered suddenly that there was a rat squatting a few yards from my face. He was waiting for me to be dead. It was simply a test of endurance, which of us could keep still long enough. I dared not make the slightest movement to frighten him away, lest I should betray myself to the enemy, and so for hours that rat and I lay and stared motionless at each other. It was, I think, the most horrible experience in the war.

NOVEL USE FOR AN OLD PIANO

The owner of one of the smaller old fashioned square piano has the best part of a very handsome as well as a commodious and useful desk. An ingenious woman with more old furniture utilizing an old mahogany square piano to secure for herself a much coveted writing desk.

She began by trying to bargain with a cabinet maker to use the wood in building the desk. Having the piano brought from the garret she looked it over critically. Instead of asking the cabinet maker to rip the old instrument to pieces and use the wood she asked him if it would not be practical to take out the musical insides, put in a sliding or folding tray on which to write. This being decided on the woman and the cabinet maker began to vie with each other which could think out the greatest number of useful suggestions.

The result was a handsome mahogany lady's writing desk with a deep drawer in front a folding lid which when opened gave ample writingspace

and an unusual number of pigeon holes and shallow drawers for stationery and other necessities. Back of several of these convenient spaces the cabinet maker arranged secret compartments which can only be opened by knowing just where to find the cunningly hidden latch.

Such piano desks are especially suited to rooms with Georgian furniture or mahogany of the older and plainer type. Plain brass or hammered silver or copper desks should be used on them in combination with hand tooled leather sets in brown and gold.

Where the piano is of black enamelled wood, as many of these old instruments are, this enamel may be scraped off and a lighter finish put on either enamel or paint. In this case the color depends on the furnishings and hangings. The furnishings of the desk where the room is chintz or silk may be of enamel or etched glass, or in rose, green, yellow or old blue lacquer.

If the desk is to be used in the nursery, the decorations may be floral or of the animal kingdom, or a series of quaint little figures well known to little people through historical tales or nursery rhymes. Here suitable accessories would be an animal inkstand of the humorous type, a queer little man with penwipers in his coat pockets, calendars of animals or birds and colored pencils and pen holders.

In buying all these accessories care should be taken to have them useful as well as ornamental and humorously entertaining. Penholders with the head of a doll on the end, or pencils made in the shape of golf clubs are not for childish fingers, which cramp too easily on well shaped writing implements without having more trying shapes to tax their muscles.
