**Scrap Iron Market Slumps In The U. S.**

CLEVELAND, March 30—(AP)—“Long expected reaction in the runaway iron and steel scrap market culminated last week in a definite price break of \$1 to \$2 per ton,” the magazine Steel reported today.

The reaction strengthened recently voiced views that the top of the inflation movement in iron and steel and related markets has almost been reached, the trade journal said.

Consumer resistance to the current high prices is increasing, bringing strong protests from steel buyers for the “fantastic prices” quoted on spot delivery of steel in the “gray” market.

Although steel shipments were hampered by blizzard conditions throughout the midwest last week, steel-making operations continued to climb.

The national input rate advanced 1.2 point to 97 per cent, of rated capacity, a new high since October, 1944. This represents the highest peacetime weekly tonnage in history with output estimated at about 1,697,000 tons compared with the previous high of 1,650,500 tons in the week of Oct. 27, 1941.

**Financial Writer Discusses Discount On Canadian Dollar**

The Canadian dollar, at par with the United States dollar in official dealings, is at a discount in the New York free foreign exchange market. In the following article William D. Horton, finance writer of the Associated Press, gives his view of the situation.

NEW YORK, March 30—(AP)—The drop in the Canadian dollar to below 93 United States cents in the free foreign exchange market last week appeared to place fresh emphasis upon United States dollar domination in world trade.

The free Canadian dollar rallied slightly Saturday and closed at 93 1-8 U.S. cents, about the lowest price since the dominion's money was officially pegged at par with the U.S. dollar last summer.

The official price, and the basis on which all foreign trade between the two countries is settled, remains at par—one Canadian dollar equals one U.S. dollar.

Some international bankers see in the lower free rate a reflection of Canada's unbalanced balance of trade with the United States. Others claim the decline is merely a gauge of local supply and demand factors.

Both groups say that revaluation rumors—denied by Canadian government spokesmen—have been a decisive factor.

Last July financial capitals buzzed with talk of the high price of the U.S. dollar. Countries wanting U.S. goods and anxious to get the most purchasing power out of their dollar assets, spoke of the need for revising the value of their currencies in terms of the dollar.

Canada boosted the worth of her currency from 90 to 100 U.S. cents. The avowed intention was to protect the Canadian economy from the effects of a drastic price rise in the United States.

Financial observers figured Canada was on solid economic ground. During the war Canada had built up a reserve of about \$1,500,000,000 in gold and U.S. dollars, the largest such balance in dominion history. In addition the United States bought heavily of many Canadian products, which was a prolific source of U. S. dollars.

Revaluation, however, had the effect of stimulating Canadian imports of U. S. goods and discouraging exports.

Another factor at work, some bankers say, is speculative selling of Canadian dollar balances on the theory that the price may go still lower. International capital is sensitive to every shift in economic and political winds and the mere rumor of revaluation has induced substantial amounts formerly held in Canada to return to the U.S.
