Earl Carr Meets Accidental Death

The community was profoundly shocked to hear of the sudden death of one of Berlin's most promising young men Earle E. Carr, who was fatally injured early Monday morning on the Newburyport Turnpike. He was rushed to the Anna Jacques Hospital following the accident and lived only about ten minutes, and did not regain consciousness. Harry West, a college chum of Brookline, Mass., was seriously injured when the motorcycle on which they were returning from Massachusetts to the University of New Hampshire left the road near the Massachusetts line and crashed into a tree. West suffered severe injuries but latest reports from the Hospital are that unless complications arise he will be able to leave in a few days.

The young men were returning to their studies at the University of New Hampshire following a visit to Mass. The motorcycle belonging to Carr was said to be going at a fast rate of speed and failed to make a sharp curve and plunged from the road.

Earle Eames Carr was born in Berlin, August 10, 1914, the son of James A. and Mabel Fox Carr. He was educated and graduated from Berlin High School in 1931. He entered the University of New Hampshire the same fall and was a Sophomore, a bright student, active in college life and a general favorite with Professors and fellow students.

He was a faithful member of St. Kieran's Roman Catholic Church. If further testimonial of the popularity of the young man were needed it was found at St. Kieran's church this morning for the church was filled with towns people, relatives and friends eager to express in some degree their sorrow and sympathy for the family. The unusual number of Mass cards and beautiful floral emblems brought a silent message of sympathy and comfort to those who had gathered to pay their respects to a young man who was universally liked.

A promising career has been checked almost at its inception. Only 18 years old, life held much of promise, he was gifted in many ways and had chosen to take up medicine, his ambition was to become of physician and surgeon and he was especially well adapted to take up the study. His pleasant cheery ways and cordial greetings for all will long be remembered as one of his endearing traits. He was a very considerate boy, his parents, sister and brother and friends coming first in his thoughts.

His sterling worth morally, mentally and socially were outstanding features of his character. He lived a brief span, brought cheer and good will into the hearts of many and deep abiding love to those near and dear to him. Surviving relatives are the parents, one sister Donna May, a brother Clifford Francis and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Edith Fox.

The flag in front of Thompson Hall on the University of New Hampshire hung at half mast as a tribute to Mr. Carr.

As soon as Mr. Carr's father was notified of the accident he left with Mr. A. Rioux, Mortician, and the body was brought to Berlin late Tuesday afternoon.

The deceased is a son of James A. Carr formerly of West Newton, P. E. I., and a grandson of Francis Carr of that place.

JOHN A. WILSON

The very sudden death of John A. Wilson of Alberton which occurred on April 27th, at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Charlottetown was a great shock to his family and to the community in general.

Mr. Wilson although not in robust health was about attending to his duties the day previous, but was suddenly stricken and rushed to the Hospital, where despite the best medical skill he passed away on Thursday afternoon.

The deceased was born in Durham, Ontario, in 1874, and when a young man went to Edmonton, Alberta, where he remained for about twenty years, carrying on an active business as a building contractor. He also held the positions of Building Inspector and Chief of the Fire Department of the city of Edmonton. Eleven years ago he moved to Alberton, P. E. Island, and became interested in the fox industry, which he carried on very successfully up to the time of his death.

The late Mr. Wilson was a man of sterling qualities, a man who loved his home, his family and his work, and his death has brought sorrow to a large circle. His cheerful disposition, Christian faith and high sense of honor will long be remembered by those who knew him best. He was a public spirited citizen always ready to do his part for the welfare of the town.

Mr. Wilson was a member of the Alberton United Church, and the funeral which was very largely attended was conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. S. Weir, assisted by the Rev. W. J. Phillips, interment being made in the Anglican Cemetery. The members of Zetland Masonic Lodge attended in a body, and conducted the last burial rites over their departed brother.

The floral tributes were many and very beautiful, bearing silent testimony of the love and esteem in which the deceased was held by neighbors and friends.
