THE OVERPRODUCTION OF NEWSPRINT

Sir,—Current newsprint statistics show an increase of 100 per cent in stocks on hand at the mills as compared with a year ago: 1 e., paper made but not sold. This, coupled with a decrease in production which now averages between 75 and 80 percent of total mill capacity, indicates the serious condition into which the newsprint industry is drifting, and it emphasizes anew the apathy of the only agency in a position to stop its downward swing, the Canadian Government, which continues to allow unrestricted exploitation and exportation of unmanufactured pulpwood to supply Canada's rivals in the production of this commodity.

The newsprint industry has now arrived at exactly the same point reached by the lumber industry a few years ago, when finished products outran market ability to absorb, and from which it has never emerged. The lumber industry, it may be remarked in passing, has an advantage over the newsprint industry in that its capital investment in plant is comparatively small and its consequent suspension of operations much less costly.

There is, as I have previously pointed out, but one way to overcome the handicap now imposed upon the newsprint industry, if not to prevent its utter collapse, and to preserve the credit and the trade balance of the Dominion to which it is such a large contributor. That is to put an immediate stop to the outflow of the low cost pulpwood that is daily crossing the line to feed the mills of Canada's principal competitors in the consolidation now going on nor artificial control of selling price will be effective so long as the productive capacity of the Canadian mills continues to rise, as it will do for a considerable time to come, and the outward flow of pulpwood is unchecked. Such makeshifts are like trying to sweep back the torrent of Niagara with a household broom.

We are cutting down and destroying one of the most beautiful works of nature, with but trifling if any profit accruing to the destroyers, owing to our cupidity and imbecility in not only producing a surplus of the two principal commodities of this conversion, namely lumber and paper, but also permitting the export of forty million trees annually in the shape of saw pulpwood. This destruction is continuing despite the fact that we are nearing the point of exhaustion of our wood supply.

The Dominion Government does not need to hesitate about applying the only remedy available. Habits Of Whales

(By British United Press.)

LONDON, October 22.—The ship Discovery arrived at Falmouth the other day, after an absence from England of two years in the South Atlantic for the purpose of gaining scientific information which will help to preserve the whaling industry in the South.

Commanded by Captain Stenhouse and with Dr. S. W. Kemp as the chief research officer, the discovery made Cape Town her headquarters, but for nine months she was cut off from civilization.

Dr. Kemp said the object of the trip was to find how to prevent the extermination of whales in the South, and so prevent a repetition of what had happened in the North. "While in the Antarctic," he said, "we have been trying to find the conditions of water, temperature of the sea, and so forth. We have also tried to find something about the food, and rate of migration of whales, a subject of which I know very little is known. A new road was done with regard to the marking of whales with a view to ascertaining if they were in the quantity of circulating air is necessary. Therefore, the windows and doors of the storage house should be left open to provide additional intakes for air while the ventilators in the roof or ceiling will act as outlets. Later on in the storage period when the tubers become dormant, the problem is to supply the small amount of oxygen required, remove the excess moisture accumulating and at the same time ensure a sufficiently high temperature to prevent frost injury. This can be achieved by controlled ventilation, using properly constructed intakes and outlets provided with regulating dampers in the flues giving a constant flow of air at all times. The control of humidity, therefore, is of extreme importance in order to insure a healthy condition of stock kept in storage."

THE RELATION OF HUMIDITY TO PROPER STORAGE OF POTATOES.

(Experimental Farms Note.)

The control of humidity in storage is largely a problem of preventing the development of diseases which rot the potato tuber. While no definite information is available at the present time regarding the proper amount of moisture actually required in a storage house, experiments conducted at the Laboratory of Plant Pathology at Fredericton, N. B., reveal that humidity should be low enough to prevent excessive condensation on the surface of tubers which predisposes such to attack by decay-producing organisms and high enough to prevent drying out of the tuber; thereby preventing shrinkage. The moisture given off by the tuber depends largely upon its temperature. An increase in temperature results in increased respiration (breathing) and transpiration (giving off water) which means a greater demand for oxygen. Thus proper ventilation becomes necessary to supply air for the oxygen needs of the tuber and to provide a means of controlling the temperature and incidentally the humidity. In the fall when the potatoes are first placed in the storage house, it is necessary to reduce the temperature as soon as possible to remove the excessive moisture accumulating on the surface of the tubers during the process of sweating. This sweating is more extreme and continues over a longer period if the potatoes are immature, moist, or covered with soil. Experiments have proven that a large percentage of the injury to potatoes in large bins occurs or starts during this period. In order

THE LAYING HOUSE.

(Experimental Farms Note.)

It has been the custom to allow four square feet of floor space per bird in the laying house and not less than 20x20 or 18x32 are recommended for 100 hens. In actual practice slightly less space is often allowed, especially when birds of the lighter breeds are kept. The space required per bird diminishes in proportion as the amount of floor space in the house increases. An area of only three square feet per bird being not uncommon in large houses.

Poultry houses are with very few exceptions of frame construction. As a measure of permanence and cleanliness concrete floors are recommended and if properly built on a foundation of loose stone or cinders to facilitate drainage are most economical in the long run. Where temperatures range below zero a straw loft is advisable since condensation upon the cold roof over their heads and severe colds may result. The straw loft is supported by 1"x3" boards, one inch apart state of the sea, and so forth.
