cards extend league lead over Brooks On the booming home run bat of Enos Slaughter and superb relief pitching by Alvin Brazie, St. Louis Cardinals defeated scrappy Cincinnati 6-4 and 8-7 in a twin bill yesterday to extend their national league lead to 2 1/2 games.

Brooklyn Dodgers bid to regain the lead hit a snag as Philadelphia Phils rallied for a 3-2 victory in the nightcap of a double-header after the Dodgers won the opener, 5-2.

Slaughter clouted a two-run circuit smash that provided the margin of victory for Cards in the fifth inning, and banged off two homers, good for three runs, in the nightcap.

Brazie was called to attend the Redleg bats in both contests. He did just that and was credited with both victories.

Slaughter erased Cincinnati's temporary 6-5 lead in the seventh inning of the nightcap when he homered after Red Schoendienst had walked. Dick Siskler connected for a circuit blow in the eighth to sew up the game.

Armed Sets New Record For Handicap By CHARLES DUNKLEY CHICAGO, Sept. 2 (AP)—Armed, the United States' handicap champion, ran the greatest race of his life at Washington Park today before the greatest crowd in Illinois racing history.

The five-year-old son of Bull Lea, owned by Warren Wright of Chicago, heading for "horse of the year" honors, set a record in winning the \$37,430 Washington Park handicap, running the rugged mile and a quarter in 2:01 to knock four-fifths of a second off the mark established by Basher a year ago.

A crowd of 54,000 Labor Day spectators backed him to the limit. He went to the post, with Doc O'Leary as a running mate, at odds of 4-6, in the biggest betting surge Chicago has ever seen. The sum of \$410,602 was wagered on the handicap alone, a record for a single race in Illinois.

The Erolie Farms' Challenge Me finished second, while the eight-year-old campaigner, Take Wing, owned by Mrs. Clyde Trout, Benched, was third, one length back. Louis B. Mayer's three-year-old filly, Honeymoon, winner of 1 P.M. at this season, was fifth in a field of 10.

As the result of his victory worth \$36,300, Armed proved into fourth place in the list of all-time money winners with \$382,775 to his credit. He is headed only by Whitlaw, Sebastic and First Fiddle.

Red Sox Beat Yankees In Double Bill (Canadian Press) Dave Ferris won his 12th straight ball game and Mickey Harris hurled a neat four-hitter yesterday as Boston Red Sox widened their first "nine American League margin to 13 1/2 games by a double victory over New York Yankees at Yankee Stadium turnout of the season, 73,551 fans.

Frank Papp pitched a five-hitter to beat the Tigers in the second game. The Sox jumped on Al Benton for four runs in the sixth and three hits which included Bob Kennedy's triple with the bases loaded.

Browns trounced Cleveland Indians 9-2 in the first game and battled the Tribesmen to a 2-2 tie in the second game which was called at the end of 12 innings because of darkness. The game will be played today as part of a doubleheader.

Jess Flores limited Washington to seven hits in his second game of another doubleheader at the Philadelphia Athletics a 7-1 victory after the Senators won the opener, 5-2.

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The Athletics pounded three Washington pitchers for 16 hits in the second game, while the Senators obtained 12 hits in the opener to give Bobo Newsom his 13th victory.

Transportation Problem WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—The United States "is facing the greatest transportation crisis in 24 years," director J. Monroe Johnson of the office of defense transportation, said today.

The real pinch will begin about Oct. 15 and continue until May, he said.

Some factories will be compelled to close down or reduce operations during periods of the fall and winter, and the movement of crops will be strung out over longer-than-usual periods. The railroads still will be moving this year's wheat crop when the next crop ripens.

The railroads simply cannot handle all the traffic which will be offered them during coming months. So when the storage facilities of industrial plants are filled, they'll just have to close down or curtail operations until they can move their goods.

Normally, Mr. Johnson said, the peak demand for railroad freight cars begins about Oct. 15 and continues several weeks. But this year the high demand will come late well into next year.

Right now the railroads are hauling more freight than at any time during the war. For the week ended July 30, the car-loading figure was over 921,000, the highest weekly loading since the week ended Oct. 12, 1941.

GENERAL CONDITIONS The 2 Year Old Futurity will be raced on 2 in 3 plan. All other races to be on the three-heat plan with the awarded the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of their being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner. Any horse winning the first two heats in any race shall retain his pole position and assume last scoring position in the race.

Rights reserved to change program, reject any entry, or if entry appears to lay over the field to the extent that there is not, in the opinion of the management, sufficient competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded. No horse is to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to attend satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of 1 per cent on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay installment in full.
