THAT Canadian apple growers have it in their power to secure and retain a very lucrative market in England is the opinion of Joel Goodwin, senior partner in the firm of J. & H. Goodwin, fruit importers of Manchester, England who is at present in Toronto, this being his first visit to Canada since 1894. Canadian apples, says Mr. Goodwin, give thorough satisfaction if they are properly selected and packed. When the English crop fails and the demand for foreign apples is heavy there is a tendency on the part of Canadian growers to be careless as to the quality and packing, and the consequence is that consignments arrive in bad shape, and poor prices are obtained. Regular fruit growers seem to understand the need of the trade.
