The next thing is shelter as you must be provided with a house. I will therefore begin with one that is vacant; it has just been left by the Chief Justice who has resided there for some time for a house of his own a little out of town. The house is now to let and is situated at the western extremity of the town opposite to the Government House, from which it is separated by a creek. There is a dining room, drawing room and study on the first floor and five or six bedrooms on the second, besides servants room, nursery etc. (upwards of 20 apartments in all) kitchen, outhouses and stables. It is situated and fronts on the harbor and commands an extensive view of it and the rivers running into it, has a flower and kitchen garden. The rent of this house is £60, sterling a year and is the highest of any in town. A very good house for a family of 6 or 7 can be had for 20 to 25 pounds sterling per year.

The fourth letter deals, in part, with the class of people comprising the 5,000 population of Charlottetown. He says: On entering the drawing room of Government House on a company night, you will perceive no marked difference between the people there assembled than you would on a similar occasion in any town in Britain. I doubt if there are many places of the same population that could, on occasion, turn out a more select party than could Charlottetown. . . . I think I am fully warranted in saying that all classes of immigrants will meet with as good society here as they have been accustomed to meet in their own country though not in so great numbers.

"At first sight, judging from the appearance of the 'Central Academy' you would be led to suppose that the love of learning had not reached across the Atlantic, to this part at least. On further acquaintance, you will find that we are better provided in this respect than the exterior of the said building promises. There are three Masters of the Academy, supported partly by salaries paid out of the Provincial Treasury and partly by tuition fees. Religion is not neglected. The Cathedral-looking spire of Catholic Chapel, surmounted with its splendid golden cross is conspicuous from afar. There is the Church of England and Church of Scotland and the Chapels of the Wesleyan Methodists and Baptists. The Colonial Building is situated in the centre of the middle square of the five City squares. In this building are the rooms of the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly. The Supreme Court holds its sittings in a room in the basement story where are also the offices of the Treasurer, Secretary, Judge of Probate, Collector of Customs, Surveyor General and Prothonotary. The Lieutenant Governor has also a room where he can always be seen on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

In any kind of a r.g. from a coach and four to a one-horse fly; if you take my advice, you will order a stout horse, or two if you can afford it, and one of the light Island made wagons which are at once easy riding, having good steel springs—and commodious. For this, you will pay for two horses 10 shillings sterling (\$2.40) per day and for one horse rig 6s and 8d (\$1.60) per day. Each additional horse will be 3s 4d (80c.) per day. If your route lies towards Prince County you will do well to make head quarters at St. Eleanors or Green's (now Summerside). At both places you will get the best Island oysters—as many as you please, breakfast dinner and supper as you like—without additional cost. Travelling is cheap, very cheap; you seldom pay more than 1s (24c.) for a good substantial meal but you won't be furnished with wine. Horse's provender is cheap, the average price of oats being 1s 24c. per bushel. I must tell you that money is of much more value in this country than it is in England. The legal rate of interest in this country being six per cent so that your 3,000 pounds sterling would give you 180 pounds (about \$900). This of itself will enable you to live, even in Charlottetown, with great comfort and respectability. With your wife and two children. You may become owner of a hundred acres of land, 28 or 30 of them under plough, a good house, barns, etc. a couple of horses, and other stock in proportion for from 500 to 600 pounds. A good farm servant will cost you from 24 to 30 pounds currency or 16 to 20 pounds sterling (about \$80 to \$100) per year, and women servants from 6 to 8 pounds (\$30 to \$40) per year. If you are anything at all of a farmer, or even a prudent man, you ought not only to live well, but after a little time to be able to lay up a trifle. The best plan for a single man who comes out, is at once to hire himself as a servant with some farmer, and if he is wise will not insist upon the question of wages. . . . There is much to be learned and much to be unlearned by the agricultural laborer of an old country, on his coming into one covered with primeval forest. The price of Island cows are from 2 to 4 pounds sterling (about \$10 to \$20), according to quality. Horses are plenty, too much so perhaps, and of all prices; good farm horses may be had from 10 to 12 pounds each sterling (about \$50 to \$60); 20 pounds sterling is a very high price and one of the best saddle or carriage horses may be had for that price, more frequently lower. Sheep are also plenty and of excellent breed. Lambs of a good sort may be had from 5s to 10s sterling (\$1.20 to \$2.40) each and those not so well bred at much lower prices. A pig of some kind is, I need not say, indispensable to all classes of settlers. What might have been the original goodness of the porcine race, when imported by the first settlers, is now of no moment; they were suffered to become degenerated so that it has been no small trouble to breed them out.

"The County Jail" is situated on "Pownall" another of these squares. Government House adjoins the town and is a rather tastefully designed wooden building facing the entrance to the harbor and presenting an imposing front surrounded by a plantation of various trees, some indigenous and some of foreign growth.

In his fifth letter, he takes us for a trip outside of the City and says: "There are two main entrances to Charlottetown, Malpeque Road and St. Peters Road. There is another main road called the Tryon Road which terminates at Bedeque. To reach Georgetown you cross the Hillsborough River by means of a steam ferry lately put on by T. B. Tremain into which you drive your horse and cartage. You have your choice of modes of travelling. The mail carriers are furnished with covered American wagons which hold six inside and will take you to St. Eleanors, 40 miles, on the one side and Georgetown, 30 miles on the other for about an English crown (\$1.20). From either places you can take your chance with the mail carrier and go to Tignish, 94 miles from Charlottetown, and to East Point, 40 miles from Georgetown and 60 from Charlottetown, when you have been from one extremity of the Island to the other. Town and the high lands of Nova Scotia in the background. There are several excellent farmers both in the Common and Royalty. Judge Peters, who commenced but a few years ago as an amateur, is deservedly reckoned a good practical, and will soon be, I think, a good scientific farmer. Hon. George Goodman, Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, has a very pretty and valuable place of his own making. Mr. Peake, a merchant of Charlottetown, is showing the effects of judicious outlay of capital, and giving proofs of the possibility of raising the soil of the Island to a degree of fertility equal to that of the most favored parts of the Mother Country. Mr. George Beer senior, was among the first to practically illustrate the benefits of liming the land, and the adoption of a judicious rotation of crops. There are many others who are equally as entitled to praise as the above, but to mention them all, would swell this letter beyond proper dimensions. There are some gentlemen seats worthy of a passing glance. Amongst several others, Mount Edward, a substantial brick edifice, is tenanted by Hon. Capt. Swabey; it is owned by the Chief Justice who resides at Spring Park—which almost adjoins the town, and is a very beautiful place, naturally, but capable of being rendered more so.—Walkingshaw Esq. is completing a brick mansion begun by the late John Grubb Esq. at Falconwood on the Hillsborough. William Forgan Esq. has a house presently situated on the road which leads to Mount Edward.
