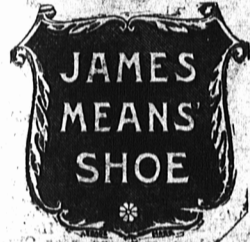

Daniel Horne, formerly of Elmsdale had a narrow escape from death on Thursday last at North Brookfield, Mass. While making a flying switch in North Brookfield yards he was caught and dragged under the car, but escaped with three broken ribs and a few other bruises. Mr. Horne says he thinks he will return home now as this is the third narrow escape in two years.

From present indications there is every reason to believe the steamer Beatrice, which was run ashore off Cranberry Head, C. B., last fall, after leaving Charlottetown on the closing of navigation, will be successfully floated. Steam-pumps were placed on board Saturday and early all the water pumped out. So far as could be ascertained the damage to the steamer's bottom is slight. Saturday evening the Amphitrite arrived at North Sydney with her second cargo of coal taken from the Beatrice. About half the coal has already been taken from the steamer's hold, and likely on Wednesday the Amphitrite and tug Iona will endeavor to float her. A line was put on board and both steamers found no difficulty in moving the Beatrice.

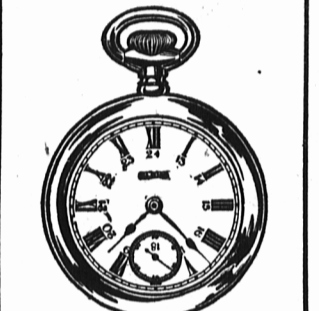
