## British May Inherit Indian Estates

TORQUAY, Eng., Nov. 10.—A twenty-five-year-old Devonshire girl may be heiress to vast estates in Hyderabad, India.

She is the Begum Syed Saadat Ali Khan, whose young husband, the Nawab Syed Saadat Ali Khan, died recently from pneumonia following peritonitis.

She was Miss Gwendolyn Reed, daughter of a Torquay farmer. She married the Nawab little more than a year ago.

Her five-months-old baby son was to have started with his nurse for India, the Nawab and his wife having planned to follow overland in a week or so afterward.

A few days ago the young widow waited outside the Mohammedan mosque at Woking, where the funeral service was being held for her husband. No women are allowed to enter a mosque.

Now she will sail for India shortly to visit the State where her husband was to have been ruler.

The Begum will not know what part of her husband's vast property she inherits until she visits Hyderabad, where she will meet her mother-in-law.

Her one-time nurse, who has lived with her and her babyhood, told me the story of her charge's romance and its tragic ending.

"They were like lovers in a fairy tale. I do not think she ever thought about his worldly possessions at all, she said. "When they were married no one realized that he was like a prince in his own country."

"At present her grief has simply stunned her. I think she found it tragic not to be able to see the burial service being held for her husband, and throughout Torquay and Paignton were known as an ideally happy couple."

"In fact, I think every one used to be pleased to see their red and green car, by which little they were known."

"The baby is the sweetest little fellow, very like his father, with the same melting brown eyes. He is called 'Johnny' in England although his real name is Farbas."

"He will go with his mother to India."

"I do not think she will live there now, but will stay on a long visit. The Nawab was known here as 'Mr. Khan,' and his friends called him 'Ali.'"

## Alleged Smugglers Arrested

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 10.—Royal Canadian Mounted Police tonight had arrested three alleged smugglers, two from McAdam and one from Saint John, who last night crossed the International border at St. Croix, N. B., in a car allegedly containing smuggled dry goods. As a result of the incident, J. A. Allison, of the Canadian Customs Service at St. Croix, lay severely injured in hospital at St. Stephen. He suffered a slight fracture of the skull and a broken arm.

Harold Devlin, Saint John, was arrested at McAdam this afternoon, together with Allison Wilson also arrested today, he was brought to Fredericton tonight and locked in police cells here. No charges had been laid against them tonight.

The third man, Leo Griffin, of McAdam, who was arrested early today, appeared before Magistrate E. Allison MacKay here on a charge of wilfully obstructing an officer in the exercise of his duty and a charge of smuggling. Griffin, not being asked to plead, was remanded until Saturday.

## Phenomena Not Unknown Re Potatoes

HALIFAX, Nov. 10.—Potatoes growing on the stem of the plant mean nothing new to Dr. Melville Cumming of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture.

"It isn't so very unusual," he replied today when questioned regarding a discovery at the farm of Isaac Preat at Moosehead, near Truro, N. S. Potatoes situated at the very top of the stems were found by the Nova Scotia farmer recently and were the cause of a good deal of conjecture.

Dr. Cumming said there were several cases of the same phenomenon quite near Halifax—last year.

The cause was an abnormal swelling of the stem—above the ground instead of under it. The potato itself is part of the stem of the plant, he said, while under that is the root. Certain favorable conditions are required to make a potato grow above ground, but he was unable to explain just what they were. It had nothing to do with the province's recent drought, however.

## Bad Looks Gets Job

## WILL AUCTION 318 NAPOLEON'S LETTERS

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Almost a century and a half after they were written, 318 letters of a "strong man" of another epoch will be sold by auction here Dec. 17.

They are the letters of Napoleon Bonaparte to the Empress Marie-Louise, all couched in affectionate terms, and revealing that the "strong-man" of the 19th century who could lead and destroy large armies has a kindly heart and a definitely sentimental streak in him.

The letters are divided into three groups. The first is composed of letters written before the marriage; the second contains affectionate letters written during 1810 in which the Emperor is constantly inquiring whether Marie-Louise is happy as Empress and not too homesick for Austria, and the third and most important group describes the Russian campaign. They all date between May 29, 1812, the day on which the Emperor took command of the large army, and Dec. 5, 1812, when Napoleon left Russia. These letters describe the victory at Moscow and the burning of Moscow, voicing the Emperor's regret at the scene of conflagration he witnessed there.

There are several letters in which Napoleon pleads passionately with the Empress to have the Austrian Emperor leave the coalition. The last of the letters is dated from Elba. "I would so like to see you and my son," it began.

## ANY 13-YEAR-OLD CAN LEARN GRAMMAR

PRINCETON, N.J., Nov. 10.—Gertrude Stein, modernist poet and author, made her speaking debut before a college audience last night, befuddling 500 Princeton undergraduates and faculty members with extracts from her works.

"I was tremendously concerned in finding out what was myself inside of me," she said among other things. "I think that's general of college students."

"The only way you can live without being bored," she said, "is to feel that every individual has a history that is worth investigating."

Her remarks—"Why make a fuss about grammar when any 13-year-old can learn it"—drew laughter and applause.

She appeared in a rough brown skirt, a brown and yellow sweater, bare-heeled shoes and hatless. When at the conclusion of her lecture, she asked if there were any questions, her dazed audience made no reply. She grinned and walked off the platform.

## Budget For A Surplus

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Nov. 10.—Budgeting for a small surplus in 1935, Trinidad's Legislature today approved estimates for revenue of more than \$8,000,000 and expenditures of \$5,000,000.

Revenue will be increased by raising gasoline, income, sweepstakes and vehicle taxes and by imposing an excise duty on local matches. Chief increases in expenditures will be made in the departments of pensions, agriculture, education, health, port and marine works, prisons and public works.

## WOULD LIKE TO SHOOT

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

GLASGOW, Nov. 10.—Sir Ian Hamilton, the "grand old man" of the British army, wants to be on Germany's side if there's another war in Europe.

"If there is going to be any tiger-shooting indulged in over Europe as is possible, I would rather go shooting with the Germans than any others," he said in an address here.

"I say this purely from the professional, not from the political or sentimental, point of view. I don't want to shoot any more tigers but if we do let's be on the side of those who can hold a gun steady and shoot straight."

## Japan is Planning New Type Warship

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Japan, it was learned authoritatively to-night, has prepared plans for construction of a large number of warships of an entirely new type, in case her demands for naval equality go unheeded in the current conversations and a naval race be started.

Whether any official hint of such plans would be given to the powers during the conversations, as a trial balloon, could not be immediately determined.

The plans, secretly prepared, embrace a new ship of economical build, so powerful that some of the fleets of the world by the Washington and London treaties might
