 usually in the neighbouring Provinces and could be supplied by our farmers with advantage to both. An increased price of 10c. per bushel would mean \$100,000 added to the value of the Island's oat crop annually. This is one of the things the Department of Agriculture is attempting, and its efforts are meeting with considerable success.

SEED FAIRS.

The first Seed Fair in Prince Edward Island was held in Charlottetown on April 3rd, 1903. It was well attended and the total number of entries was nearly one hundred. The following year there was an increase in both attendance and exhibits, but the matter did not receive the hearty support of the farmers, and in 1906 the attendance was so discouraging that it was suggested that seed fairs should be held elsewhere than in Charlottetown.

Accordingly, the Commissioner of Agriculture welcomed a proposition made by a committee from Prince County to hold the Provincial Seed Fair in Summerside in the following year. The committee in charge spent considerable time and energy working up the Fair and were rewarded for their efforts by 226 entries and a very large attendance. The educational program, too, was of a high order and the Seed Fair in its new home soon became a flourishing institution. In 1909 a Department of Household Science was added and has become a very important part of the institution.

In 1911 the Central Seed Fair, with a Department of Household Science, was established in Charlottetown and has been held regularly since. The year 1912 saw a very considerable expansion of the Seed Fair idea. The committee in charge of the Provincial Seed Fair felt that Prince Edward Island was not making the advance as a seed centre that the Provincial Fair would seem to suggest, and they added the regulation that all first-prize grain should become the property of the committee and be sold on the last day of the Fair by public auction.

A King's County Seed Fair was also organized at Georgetown and in 1913 local Seed Fairs at Souris and at Murray River were also held, so that there are now five Seed Fairs in existence, all well patronized and serving the interests of their several districts. These local Fairs have much to their credit. They have brought out many exhibitors who would not be induced to make their first plunge in a Fair, provincial in scope, but who have since become very keen competi-

KNIFE IS THE ONLY CURE FOR CANCER

LONDON, July 24.—The annual report of the Imperial Cancer Research Fund shows that investigations and experiments made during the year did not reveal any cure other than the early surgical removal of a cancer.

Fewer claims to the possession of a cure had been put forward during the year than in previous years. None of these claims was new and none necessitated further inquiry. Many attempts had been made to obtain aids to the diagnosis of suspicious cases, but none of them gave reliable results. The bulk of the report deals with special investigations of the belief that there were such places as "cancer houses" and "cancer arois." Five of the best known instances of "cancer houses" had been investigated. The results of the inquiries are set forth in detail and show that the belief is groundless.
